# **Changes to Utility Safety Partners Billing**

The Federation will no longer be the billing agent for Utility Safety Partners.

In January, new information from Utility Safety Partners indicated that they would be offering to utilities the lowest rate for natural gas utilities. Previous to this, no Federation ber Utility was large enough to reach that rate unless all were combined under the Federation banner. With that no longer being the case, the Federation will no longer be the billing agent. Moving forward, individual utilities will need to work directly with Utility Safety Partners on billing.



In the past, Alberta One Call (rebranded as Utility Safety Partners) had three tiers of rates that were based on volumes of calls within a year. By combining all Member Utilities, the Federation reached that lowest rate and was able to bill to utilities at a rate lower than they would have received individually.

Utility Safety Partners' new fee structure is more of a membership fee based on a company's annual locates based on a rolling-three year average. It also takes into account the level of risk that comes with the company's category.

Currently, there is only one category for natural gas on Utility Safety Partners' risks matrix. The concern is that distribution systems are being looked at with the same risk as energy producers and high pressure transmission pipelines.

The Federation has written a letter to Utility Safety Partners requesting that the natural gas category be split up so that distribution systems – which are at a lower risk – are not in the same category and thus fees as much higher risk infrastructure.

A template letter for Member Utilities to voice the same opinion is being distributed to Member Utilities.

# **Stony Plain Honours West Parkland**

The co-op was recognized for its growth and its engagement with the community over 2021. That included reaching a milestone of 5,000 members last year, and its expansion with the addition of West Parkland Propane.

recognition was extended in part because of West Parkland's efforts to support and give back to the community. They have volunteered with local charities and spearheaded a number of fundraising activities such as the Parkland Food Bank. They also teamed up with the Town's Mayor, William Choy, last August for a dunk tank fundraiser on behalf of the Co-ordinated Suicide Prevention Program.

# **SANG Community Enhancement Foundation**

Supporting the community is the focus of a foundation formed by Ste Anne Natural Gas Co-op.

The co-op created the SANG Community Enhancement Foundation in 2020 as a way to help them do more to help their local community. It helped to stream charity money and recruit help for community events in a way that did not cost the co-op.

The co-op already has a long history of supporting causes, includings its signature mplishment with the Kids With Cancer Society. Combined with the 50-year history of the co-op in the community, it gave them a lot of community standing to do more.

By creating a foundation and applying for grants, they produced far greater changes than the co-op alone could. A foundation board was created from current staff and board, and a one-time "seed" deposit was made to the foundation from Ste Anne's existing sponsorship allocations. Foundations fees were also voted on at the co-op's annual general meeting to make the foundation self-supporting.

The foundation aims to provide financial aid, donated skills, and material to enhance the social well-being of local groups and individuals in the Ste Anne Natural Gas area. The work is guided and informed by their beliefs and commitments to inclusiveness. The SANG Community Foundation announced itself official in July 2021, and since then have donated \$18,000 to:

# Limited Time Available to Register for CyAware Course

There is still some time left for Member Utilities to enroll staff and directors in Aon's CyAware cyber security training modules at no cost to your utility.

Until April 1, 2022, the FedGas Insurance Reciprocal Exchange (FIRE) will reimburse utilities for registration costs for CyAware. The normal cost is only \$15 per person. It is recommended that all employees in a utility be allowed to take the training, and it is available to Directors/Councillors.



After April 1, registration will be a the utility's cost through Aon.

CyAware (Cyber Awareness Training) is a fun, interactive training platform with 12 modules on cyber security best practices. It educates users on critical cyber security topics, such as personal cyber security best practices, how attackers infiltrate systems, how to identify malware and ransomware, and how to help safeguard company data and systems from attacks.

# What are the Hazards with Trenching and Excavation?

Working in trenches and excavations is hazardous to both the workers who work inside them, and to workers on the surface. The hazards include:


- · Cave-ins or collapses that can trap workers
- Equipment or excavated soil falling on workers (e.g., equipment operated or soil/debris stored too close to the excavation)
- · Falling into the trench or excavation
- Flooding or water accumulation
- Exposure to a hazardous atmosphere (e.g., gas, vapour, dust, or lack of oxygen) Contact with buried service lines such as electrical, natural gas, water, sewage, telecommunications, etc.
- Contact with overhead electrical lines
- Slips, trips and falls as workers climb on and off equipment, or from inappropriate access and egress methods
- · Being struck by moving machinery, or by falling or flying objects. Hazards related to materials handling (e.g. lifting, struck by, crushed between, etc.).

# Safe Digging Awareness Month April 2022

Alberta has a very comprehensive and complex infrastructure that provides essential goods and services to all Albertans.

Each year there are numerous instances where the integrity of this infrastructure is jeopardized by improperly conducted ground disturbances. Failure to Call or Click Before You Dig to have buried facilities identified and their locations riked prior to disturbing the ground is the most frequent use of buried facility damages.

As per Utility Safety Partners (formerly known as Alberta One-Call), each year Albertans pay more than \$350 million to repair damages caused when homeowners and contractors dig without knowing what is below. There is also potential for an even higher cost; contact with an underground utility can result in severe injury and death.

All ground disturbers (contractors, homeowners and landowners) can save time and money and keep themselves and our province safe by following ground disturbance and buried facility damage prevention Guidelines and Best Practices.



**Preventable Damage Totals** 

2022 (YTD): 25 2021: 122 2020: 132 2019: 120

Ground disturbance Guidelines and Best Practices include but not limited to:

- Ensure locate is completed and valid for the area in advance of any ground disturbance project or activity,
- Waiting for the buried facility locates to be done,
   Respecting the locate marks, Exposing any conflicting buried facilities before using mechanical excavation equipment and digging with care,
- If task is near an area deemed to be high risk, it is recommended a review of the locate and hazards associated be completed with the excavator/contractor prior to ground disturbance.

<u>3 working days advance notice required.</u> Defines minimum number of days in advance of a digging project that you need to notify the one call center of your intent to dig.

<u>Locates are valid for 30 days unless otherwise stated by owner/operator.</u> The maximum period of time the locate marks (paint, flags, etc.) are valid while they are maintained and clearly visible. Determined by regional legislation and best practices.

The Federation of Alberta Gas-Co-ops Ltd. fully supports Safe Digging Awareness Month and encourages all ground disturbers to always Call or Click Before You Dig.

We encourage organizations, communities, and individuals to consider holding or supporting a virtual event, or simply pause at 11:00 am on April 28 for a moment of silence.

These acts of remembrance help to honour the lives lost or injured due to workplace tragedy, while also acknowledging the sacrifices of frontline and essential workers who have died or become ill serving during the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### **Historical Statistics**

The most recent statistics from the Association of Workers'
Compensation Boards of Canada (AWCBC) tell us that in 2019, 925
workplace fatalities were recorded in Canada. 882 were male
workers, and 43 were female workers. Among these deaths were
29 young workers aged 15-24. Add to these fatalities the 271,806
accepted claims (an increase from 264,438 the previous year) for
lost time due to a work-related injury or disease, including 33,615
....n workers aged 15-24, and the fact that these statistics only
include what is reported and accepted by the compensation boards,
there is no doubt that the total number of workers impacted is even

greater. And it's not just these numbers on which we need to reflect. With each worker tragedy there are loved ones, family members, friends and co-workers who are directly affected, left behind, and deeply impacted – their lives also forever changed.

In 1991, eight years after the day of remembrance was launched by the Canadian Labour Congress, the Parliament of Canada passed the Workers Mourning Day Act making April 28 an official Day of Mourning. Today the Day of Mourning has since spread to more than 100 countries around the world and is recognized as Workers' Memorial Day, and as International Workers' Memorial Day by the International Labour Organization (ILO) and the International Trade Union Confederation (ITUC).

It is the hope of the Federation that the annual observance of this day will help strengthen the resolve to establish safe and healthy conditions in the workplace, and prevent further injuries, illnesses, and deaths. As much as this is a day to remember the deceased, it is also a call to protect the living and make work a place where people can thrive.

# Safety and Health Week May 1-7, 2022

Safety and Health Week (Formerly known as NAOSH ek) was first launched in June 1997.

During the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) talks, workplace safety within the boundaries of all three nations was discussed by each country's labour department representatives.

Canada's representative at these talks was familiar with Canada's COHS Week (CSSE's Canadian Occupational Health and Safety Week) and suggested to his Mexican and American counterparts that their untries may wish to become involved in a similar condeavor. It was agreed that CSSE would adopt the North American concept and implement it in place of the Canadian Week, and it was deemed the proprietor and governing body.

The goal of Safety and Health Week is to focus employers, employees, partners and the public on the importance of preventing injury and illness in the workplace, at home and in the community. Its success is rooted in a community-based approach. Across the country, Safety and Health Week events and activities are coordinated by local, provincial and/or regional committees, comprised primarily of volunteers, who share a focus and vision of safer workplaces and communities. Partnerships with government, business.



suppliers, CSSE Chapters, community health organizations and other safety groups provide the support, resources and network necessary to manage the Safety and Health Week plans.

The three hands forming an equilateral triangle portrays the three participating nations – Canada, the USA and Mexico – and symbolizes joint venture, cooperation and the commitment to the common goals shared by all occupational health and safety partners, as well as all tripartite partnerships between business, labour and governments. The connected hands illustrate assistance cooperation on many levels – from interpersonal relationships in the workplace to international exchange.

Re: Request for Classification Change for Low Pressure Distribution Systems

Tom,

Thank you for your letter dated March 11, 2022 presenting the Federation's request to review the classification of its member assets relative to the Risk and Consequence Matrix developed for Utility Safety Partners Annual Member Fee (AMF).

We agree the consequences following a breach of a transmission pipeline and a FedGas member's low-pressure gas distribution line would be dramatically different, and that was realized when Det Norske Veritas delivered the Risk Matrix to USP. However, given the rural characteristics of most transmission pipelines and FedGas member assets, it was also realized the risk of damage to both asset groups is essentially the same – low – and it was for that reason Federation member assets were included in the Transmission category. Quite simply, it was the best fit and the outcome produced a favourable fee reduction for FedGas members. It was never anticipated, however, that this grouping could also produce a possible insurance issue.

Your suggestion to develop a Natural Gas facilities category / sub-category is understood and USP will commit to doing so for the 2023 AMF, which will be presented to the USP Board of Directors in late June. In the interim, I trust this correspondence and our commitment to update the AMF categories for next year will satisfy your members and their respective insurance brokers should inquiries arise.

Gary and I look forward to presenting to your members June 16, 2022.

# **GOVERNMENT & INDUSTRY RELATIONS**

Federation Board and Administration frequently meet government and industry to discuss issues relevant to utilities and the natural gas industry.

## **GOVERNMENT RELATIONS**

Federation Board and Administration have frequent meetings with Government Members and officials. Primarily, these are with Alberta Agriculture, but may include other Ministries or meetings with MLAs for educational purposes.

# **Updates**

- Met with Alberta Energy Regulator CEO and President Laurie Pushor to discuss issues arising from their high pressure pipelines levy announcement.
- Worked with Rural Utilities and Alberta Agriculture to secure a new rural gas grant program agreement. This agreement has now been completed.

#### INDUSTRY RELATIONS

The Federation meets with other organizations to discuss areas of common interest. Organizations may include, but are not limited to: ATCO, AltaGas, Alberta Community and Co-operative Association, Alberta Common Ground Alliance, Alberta One-Call, Canadian Gas Association, Measurement Canada.

# **Updates**

 Federation has become a non-voting observer on the Canadian Gas Association board of directors. This allows the Federation to be at the table when positions are being decided, and provides us with more representation at a Federal level. At this time, the Federation cannot be a voting member without owning utility assets.

# **OPERATIONS**

Federation undertakes activities to assist Member Utilities in their field operations, including Measurement and Meter Management Services, O&M Guidelines and O&M Audits, and Odorant delivery

# **MEASUREMENT**

Measurement inspects gas measurement equipment at RMO stations on a biennial basis, performs EVC inspections, manages the data collection and alarm reporting system and available to support gas measurement inquiries as part of the Measurement Contract. Orders and distributes Measurement Canada residential AMR seals as requested, oversees the Meter Management Program and through the Measurement Canada Accreditation perform recertifications on EVC devices in the field.

- Additional seals have been ordered. Most years around 5,000 are ordered, this year the order was increased to 20,000 due to demand.
- Measurement Canada inspection successfully completed in January

North Meter Inspection program scheduled to begin in early Spring

## **0&M**

O&M Committee meets 11 times a year or more to review the Guidelines For Operation and Maintenance Practices in Alberta Natural Gas Utilities (O&M Manual) sections.

O&M Audit questions are asked based on the information in the O&M Manual to ensure all utilities are meeting the requirements.

# **Updates**

- Committee is continuing working on reviewing sections of O&M Manual.
- Preparation is underway for the 2022 O&M Audits.

# **ALBERTA ODORANT SERVICES**

The Federation along with Bow River Gas Co-op Ltd., East Smoky Gas Co-op Ltd., and Smoky Lake County administrate the subsidiary Alberta Odorant Services to provide mercaptan deliveries to Member Utilities and third parties.

# **Updates**

 Delivery drivers continue to collect data on deliveries through an electronic form and provide fill records to the Utilities at the time of delivery. Expecting to move other fill records to an electronic form mid summer 2022

#### GIS

The Federation works with the GIS Users Group and GIS Users Group Executive Committee to develop a central GIS accessible by Member Utilities.

# **Updates**

- The Federation is working with County of Vermilion River and Chief Mountain Gas Co-op on the set-up of the Esri Enterprise GIS server
- County of Vermilion River is currently housing the Federation GIS server and are updating data as it comes in. This maintains the mapping repository.
- Once the server is complete, any utility with Esri products will be able to access the database and update their own information. Currently, utilities with Esri products can download their data and work on it independently

# **Health & Safety**

The Federation Health and Safety Program is a suite of services allowing individual utilities the ability to maintain their health and safety programs, and to audit utilities on their individual programs.

- New Health and Safety Program Specialist Brett Wood was hired in January. He has met with the Health and Safety Working Group and has been building an understanding of the Federation Health and Safety Management system.
- Health and Safety Working Group will be filling a vacancy.
- Work has begun on developing a health and safety-oriented quarterly communication for
  Utilities health and safety reps that can be used for safety meeting topics, industry stats and
  health and safety trends. This will enhance information sharing and encourage all safety reps to
  share and provide input to the Working Group.

- Updates to the Health and Safety Documents are posted the Member side of the Federation
   Web Site. A red asterisk now marks the area of the updates.
- The Working Group has been working on reformatting the health and safety management system manual.
- Health and Safety program shares information related to incidents, safety bulletins, and safetyrelated correspondence from external organizations.

# **SCADA**

The VT SCADA system is available to all Measurement Contract members. This system will be replacing the current Honeywell PowerSpring system that has served the members over the past two decades.

# **Updates**

- Members have been transitioning on to the new SCADA system since January. Comments back
  as the orientation sessions are complete have been very positive and the users like the features
  and ability to access the system on portable devices.
- During the transition Members will continue to receive their alarms and gas measurement data through PowerSpring during the heating season, allowing the members to use and get familiar with the SCADA features and still have confidence with what they have been using.
- Full transition will be completed before July 1, 2022 when Power Spring will be retired.

# **ADMINISTRATION & CORPORATE SERVICES**

Administration and Finance manages most of the day to day operations of the Federation. This includes responsibilities such as: Finance, Office Administration, Member Services, Convention and Training Administration, RUBIS Billing Services, Communications, Human Resources, and works with the Board of Directors on governance matters.

# **FINANCE**

The Finance section approves purchases, sends out invoices, maintains payroll, assists the financial auditors, develops and monitors budgets. It also provides accounting for the Federation, grant program, measurement, RUBIS, Alberta Odorant Services, and Alberta Federation of Rural Water Co-operatives.

# **Updates**

- Riser levy distributed just prior to the new year. Thank you to utilities for being so quick to make payments on your accounts!
- Developing new finance policies and procedures for the Federation Board and office staff
- Quarterly Financial reporting to the Federation Board

#### COVID-19

- The Federation will no longer require proof of vaccination or proof of Covid-19 negative test for attendees of Federation-sponsored events or to the Federation Centre
- The Federation office will keep a double vaccination policy for permanent staff, but will no longer apply to contract workers

# **ADMINISTRATION**

Administration is responsible for maintaining the Federation calendar and booking all meeting rooms or offsite meetings. It is also responsible for planning Federation meetings and events, filing, mail-outs, maintaining the Federation Centre and its tenants, maintaining information technology, maintaining Federation website and the Alberta Federation of Water Co-ops website, supporting FedGas Insurance Reciprocal Exchange meetings, and is normally the first point of contact for enquiries or customer complaints.

# **Updates**

- Federation Charity Golf Classic has been booked for August 18, 2022
- June Members Meeting/FIRE AGM has been booked for June 16, 2022 at the Radisson Hotel Edmonton South
- Spring Zone Meetings schedule has been distributed (March 21-April 1)
- Fall Zone meeting dates not finalized but expected to be second half of October
- Consultant Suzanne Polkosnik has been hired to complete the Cost of Service Study.
- The Directors Handbook is being revised. A consultant has completed a strategic planning template for the handbook. Other sections of the handbook are being completed.
- Federation website being redeveloped. A request for proposals was issued. Administration is finalizing plans to proceed with a contractor
- Request for proposals distributed for a board strategic planning session on identity and branding. Proposals are currently being reviewed.
- Supplemental Bylaws are being reviewed for revisions. A number of revisions have been proposed by the Governance Committee and are being looked at by legal counsel

# **BENEFITS & PENSION**

The Federation works with Alberta Municipal Services Corporation (AMSC) to provide benefits and pension to employees and directors of Member Utilities. AMSC provides the actual administration of the benefits and pension program. The Federation negotiates rates and works with AMSC to ensure employees and directors are being treated as best as possible. The Federation sits on the AMSC Pension Advisory Group, and the AMSC Benefits Advisory Group. In addition, the Federation reviews Human Resources policies with legal and AMSC, and makes recommended changes to utilities as required.

# **Updates**

- Travel insurance moved to Orion on January 1. AMSC held two webinars to inform people of the change and what it means. The sessions were recorded with one posted to the Federation website, along with a PowerPoint presentation on the changes.
- AMSC has been delayed in deploying their new computer system and will not be able to bill
  utilities for the new travel insurance yet. Rates will still be effective and it is planned to catch up
  with the billing at a later invoice.

# **COMMUNICATIONS**

Communications is responsible for internal bulletins such as the Board to Board newsletter, Federation Status Report, Federation meeting presentations, and email bulletins. It is also responsible for external communications such as Federation briefing

packages, brochures, trade fairs, advertising, social media, and provides assistance for government and industry relations.

# **Updates**

- Federation is the major rural sponsor for Curling Alberta's new Ready to Rock program. It will bring champion curlers to a variety of communities to give kids a free lesson in curling, and if the kids want to continue there is a follow-up \$20 8-week program. Member Utilities in or close to communities are being asked whether they want to sponsor snacks/lunch for the event. #### TRAINING

Works with Training Committee, Trainers, and Third-Party Organizations to modify and develop training courses, and to put on training courses for Member Utilities – including setting facilities, working with hotels, ordering materials, and maintaining a database of course history.

# **Updates**

- One class of Gas Utility Operator Level 1 practical took place in January, with a second Level 1
  practical class scheduled for late February 22 March 4. Gas Utility Operator Level 2 has begun
  online with the in-class portion scheduled for April.
- By the end of January, there have been 42 classes (across all courses) scheduled with close to 400 students registered for the courses that have been held and upcoming
- More classes have since been opened up register online in the Members Area.
- Review is taking place on Gas Utility Operator for where updates could be made, including working with Alberta Apprenticeship and Industry to ensure the provincial exam is also updated
- The Emergency Preparedness course is being reviewed for an update

# **CONVENTION**

Federation Convention and Trade Fair typically occurs over 5 days at the end of November. It incorporates a Trade Fair, training for Service and Office personnel, Managers Meeting, Chair's Meeting, general training, and an AGM. Over 600 people take part. Meetings are required with multiple hotels, speakers, and others to organize the event.

- A Vote by Alternative Means was held in December to approve the riser levy, 2020-2021 audited financial statements, and appointment of auditor for 2021-2022. All motions were carried.
- Hotel contracts have been secured for the 2022 convention for November 27-December 1, 2022

# **QUALITY ASSURANCE & TECHNICAL SAFETY**

Federation oversees program to ensure PE pipe has been quality inspected, and takes part in numerous Technical Safety Committees CSA, Alberta Safety Codes, CGA, Utility Safety Partners and others.

# **Updates**

- UV stability for outdoor storage has been increased to 3 yrs. Working on capturing if any of our piping is affected by this due to the downturn in the economy.
- Asking AER for exemption for Composites and thermoplastic pipes suitable for HP.
- An exemption has been granted to allow black pipe with a yellow stripe in cases where there is a shortage of yellow pipe

# **RURAL INTERNET COMMITTEE**

- Working with government for an exemption to allow gas pipeline and fiber conduits to be trenched at the same time in provincial highway right-of-ways
- Working to get technical standards to allow for fiber to be installed on power pole systems

# **GRANTS AND EASEMENTS**

Department oversees the distribution of the Rural Gas Grant and Ancillary Services, including easements. Federation annually receives \$2.475 Million from Alberta Government for the Grant and Ancillary Services.

#### **RURAL GAS GRANT**

Alberta Agriculture and Forestry has authorized the Federation to be the distributor for the Rural Gas Grant to the non-investor-owned utilities.

#### Updates

 A multi-year (2021 and 2022 Construction) Rural Gas Grant Agreement with the Province has been approved.

# **EASEMENT SERVICES AND AUDITS**

Federation provides services to help utilities gain rights-of-ways or determine what easements/parcels are already on a land area. This service is provided to Member Utilities, Non-Member Gas Utilities, REAs, and Water Co-ops on a fee basis. Construction audits for the Rural Gas Grant. Cadastrals are provided to Member Utilities.

## Updates

2021 Easement Audits are presently being conducted.

# **FEDERATION INSURANCE RECIPROCAL & EXCHANGE (FIRE)**

Reciprocal has been set up to manage insurance needs of Member Utilities, the Federation, and Gas Alberta

Aon Reed Stenhouse manages the reciprocal on behalf of the Federation. Federation Board acts as the Board of Directors for FIRE. The Co-operators is the insurance holder for the Reciprocal.

- CyAware cybersecurity training has been added to the Federation's training registration portal.
  The portal will take utilities interested in the training modules to a Fedgas site dedicated to the
  training, including a fillable form which will need to be filled out and sent to Carin Shank at Aon.
  FIRE will cover the costs of this this training (\$15 per person) until April 1, 2022, and will be
  applied retroactively.
- FIRE bylaws have gone through a revision process to modernize and update some wording.
   Revisions will be brought to the FIRE annual general meeting in June
