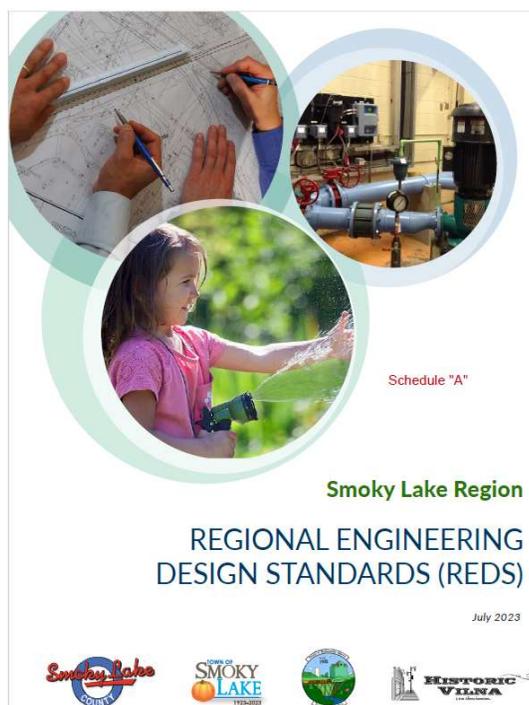

Purpose: To implement a policy that establishes minimum acceptable Regional design standards and criteria for the preparation and submission of plans and specifications for the orderly and satisfactory development of subdivisions and other municipal services within the County.

Policy Statement and Guidelines:	
<p>1. STATEMENT:</p> <p>1.1 Smoky Lake County recognizes that prospective developers require clarity with respect to minimum subdivision design criteria and municipal servicing requirements.</p> <p>1.2 Smoky Lake County will provide certainty to prospective developers with respect to minimum subdivision design criteria and municipal servicing standards and specifications in a clear and transparent manner.</p> <p>1.3 Smoky Lake County will provide a consistent approach with respect to minimum subdivision design criteria and municipal servicing standards and to align its servicing standards and specifications with its regional municipal partners.</p> <p>1.4 Smoky Lake County has developed these standards and specifications collaboratively with its regional municipal partners, and has developed the standards in a manner that encourages good engineering and construction practices.</p> <p>1.5 These standards and specifications are intended to serve as the minimum allowable levels to which the improvements discussed are to be built, and to enable standardization throughout the County.</p> <p>2. PROCEDURES:</p> <p>2.1 The Regional Engineering Design Standards (REDS) SCHEDULE "A" will be updated periodically as needed, at the sole discretion of the County.</p> <p>2.2 The CAO or designate is hereby authorized to make amendments to the REDS as deemed necessary.</p> <p>2.3 No deviation or variance from the REDS shall be permitted without the expressed written consent of Smoky Lake County.</p> <p>2.4 The use of the REDS is intended for general information only. Detailed specifications and guidelines for projects with the County will be determined by the County on a site-specific basis at the time of development.</p> <p>2.5 In the event of conflicting specifications, the CAO or designate shall be the sole authority in determining all approved specifications.</p>

Sponsor RMA Resolution - Modern Sport Fishing Regulations Supporting Ecosystems, Rural Tourism, Quality of Life, and Economic Development

819-23: Fenerty

That Smoky Lake County sponsor the following resolution to be considered at the Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA) Fall 2023 Convention, subject to a second from another RMA municipal member to fulfill a district level endorsement, titled: “Modern Sport Fishing Regulations Supporting Ecosystems, Rural Tourism, Quality of Life, and Economic Development”:

WHEREAS angling is an enjoyable pastime shared by many residents, as well as visitors to this Province and rural communities; and

WHEREAS nearly ten years have lapsed since, Alberta released the latest Fish Conservation and Management Strategy for Alberta in 2014; and

WHEREAS sportfishing in Cold Lake requires either an Alberta Sportfishing License for the Alberta portions, or a Saskatchewan Angling License for the Saskatchewan portions; and

WHEREAS currently, only spears propelled by spring, elastic, compressed gas, or muscular power are permitted, and they may only be utilized by persons who are swimming, and spears or bows cannot be used to harvest any trout, mountain whitefish, Arctic grayling, lake sturgeon, walleye, or northern pike anywhere in Alberta; and

WHEREAS Alberta has made strides in its ability to manage and monitor fish populations and species at risk, as well as enforce angling regulations on a site-specific basis; and

WHEREAS an increasing number of tour operators are interested in expanding or innovating in this space;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rural Municipalities of Alberta urge the Province of Alberta to review, modernize, and advance its Sportfishing Regulations, including but not necessarily limited to catch limits, spear/bowfishing, and seeking to implement and achieve more nuanced and site-specific measures for the purposes of supporting ecosystems, rural tourism, quality of life, and economic development,

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Rural Municipalities of Alberta urge the Province of Alberta to collaborate with the Province of Saskatchewan on innovating, harmonizing, and collaborating on the same;

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Rural Municipalities of Alberta specifically lobby the Ministries of Alberta Tourism and Sport, Alberta Forestry and Parks, and especially Alberta Environment and Protected Areas (including the Division of Fish and Wildlife Stewardship) to continue public education on sustainable angling.

WHEREAS small and medium-sized community halls and facilities serve as gathering-places, cultural centers, youth and family hubs, evacuee reception and emergency operations centers; and

WHEREAS small and medium-sized community halls and facilities are confronted with an existential challenge as they seek to rebuild and return to sustainability in a post-COVID world; and

WHEREAS many rural municipalities simply lack the capacity to single-handedly shoulder the burden of bridging supports for these facilities and groups;

Recommendation:

That Smoky Lake County, as managing partner of the Smoky Lake Region Heritage Board, acknowledge the generous donation from Mr. Jim Ratsoy, in the amount of \$100,000.00 received by the Town of Smoky Lake, in support of the Provincial Historic Resource designated in 2007, known as the iconic Canadian Northern (CN) Railway Station in the Town of Smoky Lake, enabling the undertaking of necessary repairs and maintenance to the building to ensure future generations are able to continue to enjoy this focal point of our community and share in the stories of our past; and approve action taken by administration in writing a thank-you letter to the donor.

Background:

Built in 1919, the Smoky Lake Station is a designated Provincial Historic Resource in 2007, for its architectural significance as a fine example of a Standard Third Class, Plan 100-72 railway station and in its symbolic value as an emblem of the central role of railways in opening the province to settlement and agriculture.

The station was typical of small rural stations constructed by the CNoR at the time. Designed by influential Winnipeg architect, Ralph Benjamin Pratt, the station featured a high hipped roof with gabled dormers - an architectural element that Pratt effectively developed into an instantly recognizable trademark for CNoR stations. The main floor included a waiting area and office while the second storey provided living quarters for the station agent. A baggage room to the west offered space for freight storage. When it was initially built, the station's exterior was clad in wood shingling.

In 1920, the CNoR was amalgamated into the Canadian National Railway (CNR); in 1936, the CNR covered the shingle siding in stucco and added the company's corporate colours of forest green and gold to the building's trim - a standard CNR practice that homogenized the appearance of stations along lines absorbed by the company. Though several other rail lines were soon abandoned as a result of the merger, and a number of stations closed down, the station at Smoky Lake proceeded to do a good business as so much farmland had been opened up to the north and east of Smoky Lake following the war.

In the 1960's however, despite the more efficient replacement of coal with diesel for fuel, rail transport in the district began to decline, as it did elsewhere in Canada. Improved roads were making motor transport more cost effective. Finally, in the late 1980's, long after passenger traffic had been curtailed, Smoky Lake ceased to be a shipment center for CN altogether. The station therefore became redundant and was scheduled for demolition. However, a group of locals quickly formed the Friends of the Smoky Lake Railway Station and purchased the structure from CN. It was then located in a block closer to the center of town and restored during the early 1990's.

It has since been used as a visitor information booth, with space set aside for museum and art gallery purposes. The Smoky Lake Canadian Northern Railway Station is one of the oldest surviving examples of this style of building in Alberta.

With the gradual disappearance of early train stations from Alberta's communities, buildings like the Smoky Lake Canadian Northern Railway Station have gained increased historic significance as symbols of the essential role that the railways played in establishing settlement and agricultural economy in the province.

The Smoky Lake Regional Heritage Board was established in the mid-2000s, with an express mandate to recognize, conserve and promote our region's exceptional historic resources. Indeed, the Town and County are also partners in an Economic Development Strategy which seeks to leverage outstanding built, natural, and cultural heritage features to support a vibrant tourism sector.

Recommendation:

That the Five Year Financial Plan for 2023-2027 be approved

Background:

MGA Section 283.1, Financial Plans and Capital Plans, states that, at a minimum, every municipality must prepare a written three-year financial plan and a five-year capital plan. Municipalities are encouraged to consider longer timeframes for financial planning if they see a benefit to doing so. As we are preparing a 5-year capital plan, we have extended the financial plan to 5 years as well.

The plan © provides summary information on the services we provide, the budget process, and the fund structure we use. It will provide the reader with valuable information regarding our reserves (restricted surplus) and their forecasted balances. It is set up to help the reader understand where revenue comes from, how we spend the money as well as what changes are predicted.

The plan is presented so that the reader can easily identify how much tax revenue is needed each year to balance the budget. There are large fluctuations predicted. This is because we keep moving large capital purchases from the current year budget to the next year budget. The amount that we will need to spend to catch up with the capital replacement in the next year keeps increasing. When reading it, you will see that the tax revenue needed to balance the budget as it stands is an unachievable amount.

The public consultation process took place in November/December, 2022. The focus was the 2023 budget with discussions regarding the future budgets.

Benefits:

- Smoky Lake County exceeds provincial requirements.
- Administration and Council can begin to plan for additional revenue needs in future years.
- Council and administration can evaluate the longer term consequences of current program and organizational decisions.
- The County can be prepared for future financial challenges and opportunities.
- This is a more proactive approach to financial planning.
- This plan is a flowing document and is adjusted and updated every year.

Disadvantages:

- Longer term financial planning requires upfront staff time.
- There are many unknown factors, therefore years 2-5 are only estimates of what we can expect.

Alternatives:

- Council can add, delete, or change the priorities in future years.

Financial Implications:

The financial plan will be updated each year to reflect the current year budget and forecasted capital requirements.

283.1(1) In this section, (a) "capital plan" means a plan referred to in subsection (3);(b) "financial plan" means a plan referred to in subsection (2).(2) Each municipality must prepare a written plan respecting its anticipated financial operations over a period of at least the next 3 financial years. (3) Each municipality must prepare a written plan respecting its anticipated capital property additions over a period of at least the next 5 financial years. (4) The 3 financial years referred to in subsection (2) and the 5 financial years referred to in subsection (3) do not include the financial year in which the financial plan or capital plan is prepared.(5) Council may elect to include more than 3 financial years in a financial plan or more than 5 financial years in a capital plan.(6) Council must annually review and update its financial plan and capital plan.

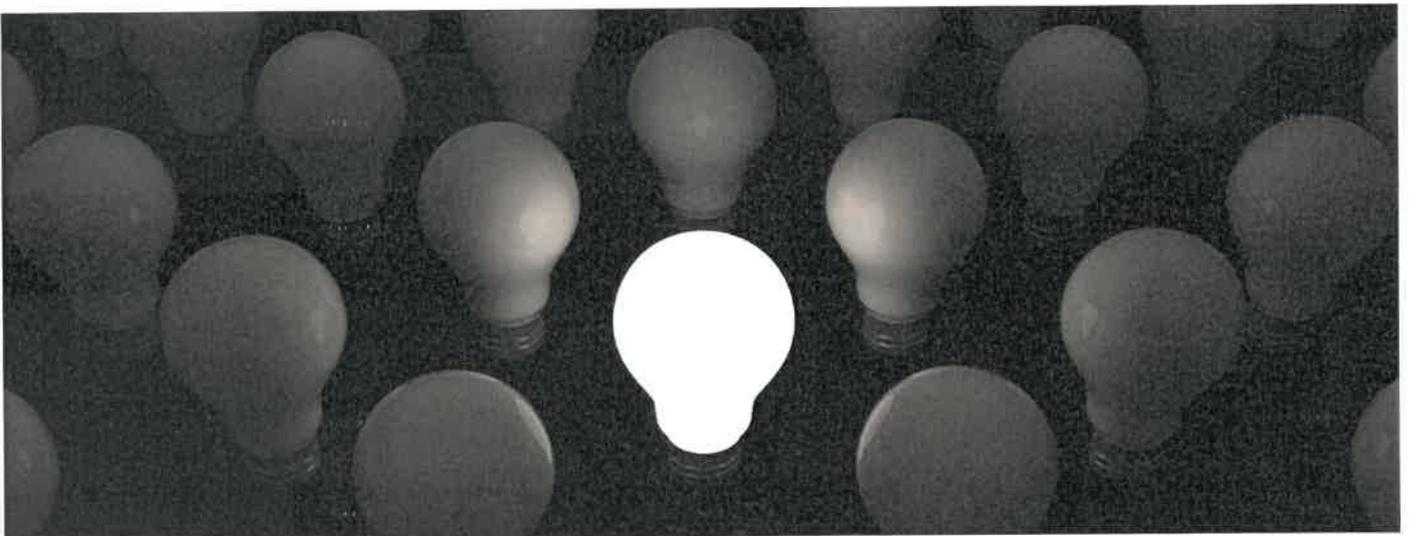

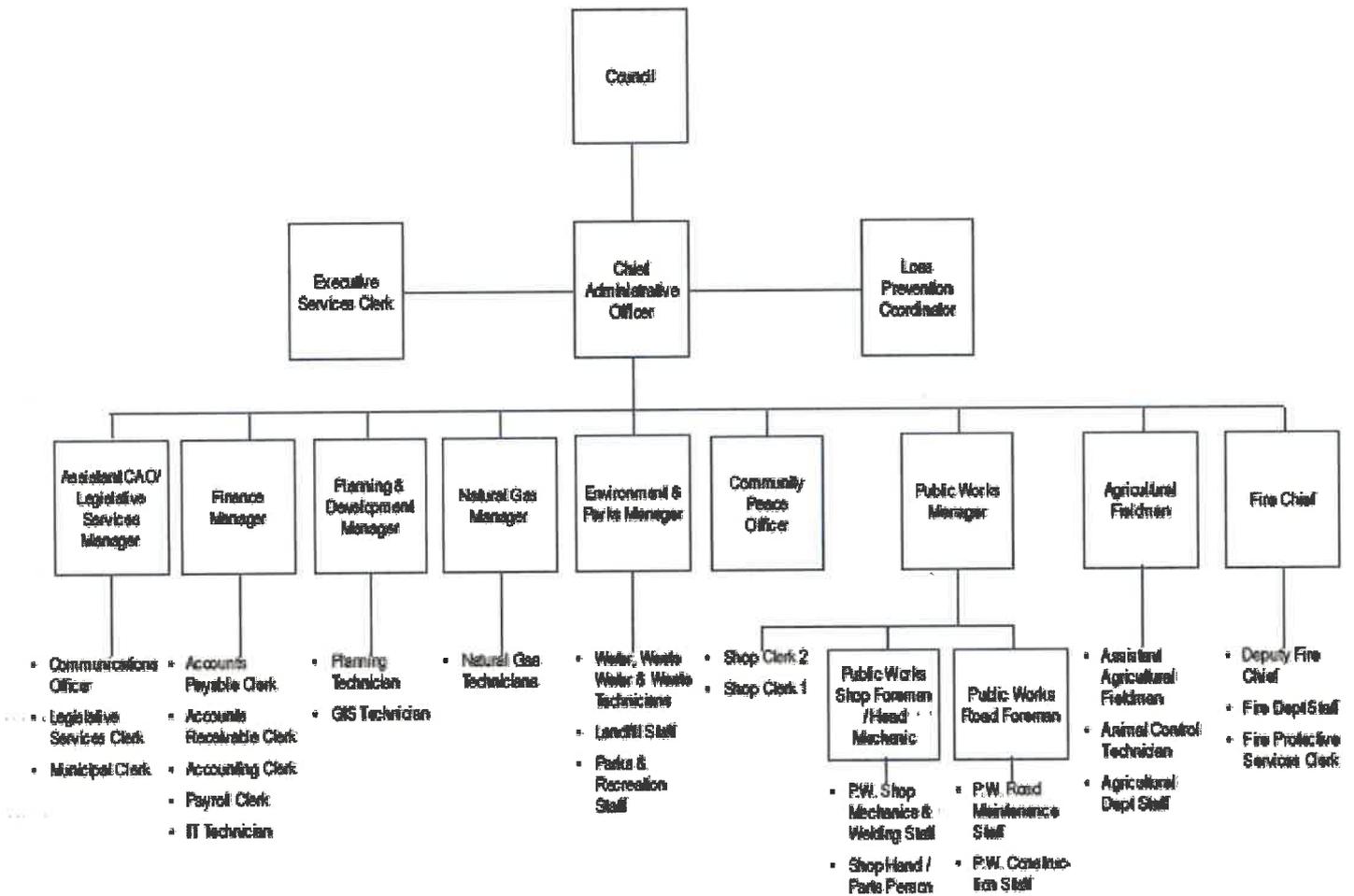

Smoky Lake County is organized so that each manager reports directly to the CAO. This structure has been established to limit the number of management levels.



Financial Policies

Smoky Lake County Council has identified long term financial planning as an important tool for sustainability. Along with the Budget Policy, there are two main policies that guide financial planning

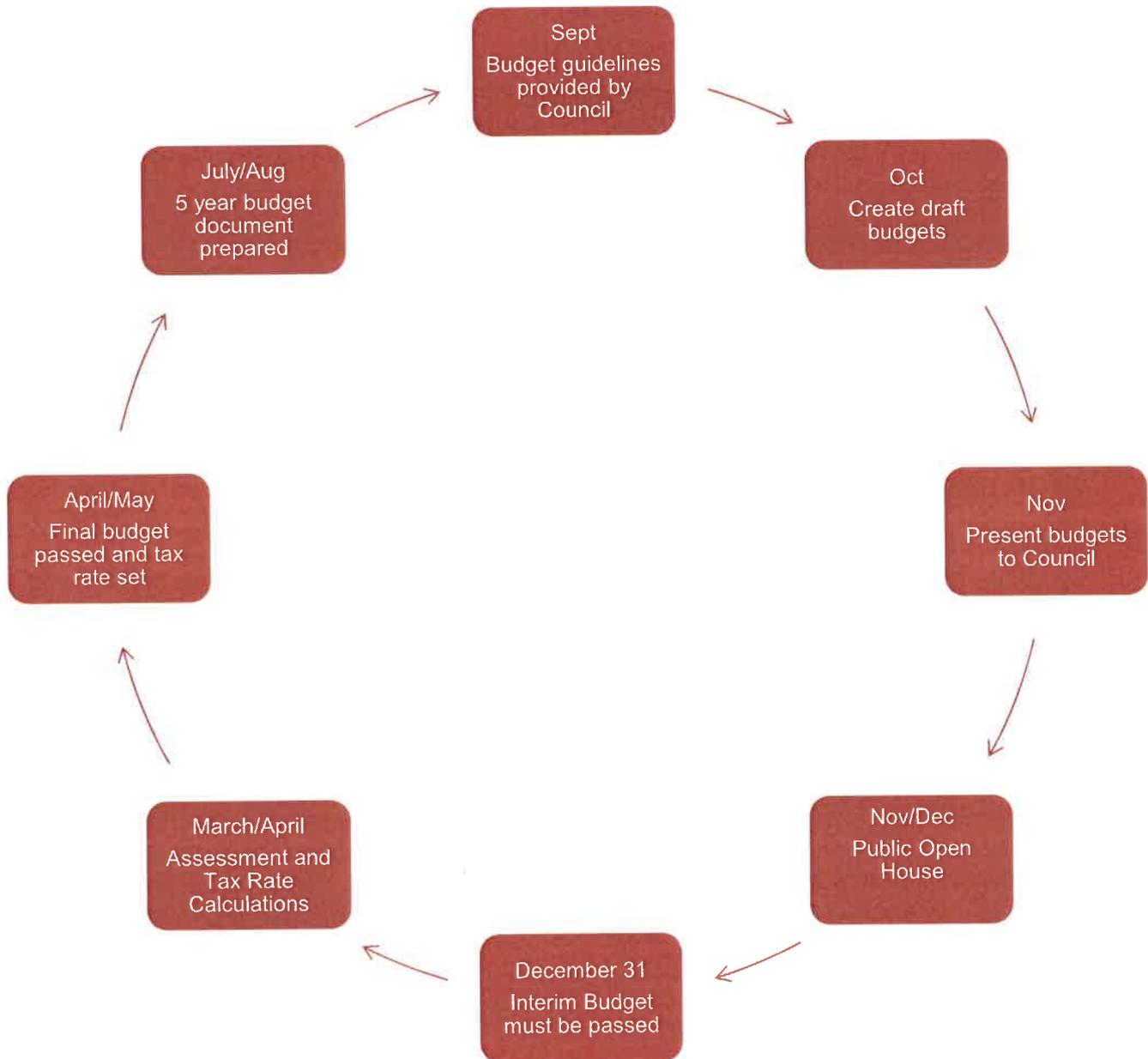
Policy 08-30-01 provides guiding principles relating to the long term financial plan

- ✓ *The municipality complies with provincial legislation and the Public Sector Accounting Board recommendations.*
- ✓ *When deciding on a course of action that may impact the whole community, the outcome of the decision will be for the benefit of the community as a whole.*
- ✓ *Core services as mandated by legislation and as required to maintain quality of life will be provided at a base level with minimal interruption to service. Revenues supporting these services will be stable, assured and sustainable.*
- ✓ *Services outside a municipality's mandate will not be provided to the community by the municipality.*
- ✓ *Resources will support a centralized labour workforce providing on-going consistent services.*
- ✓ *Communications will center on information provision to the community and will meet all legislated requirements.*
- ✓ *Revenues collected from unreliable, one-time or uncertain sources should be applied to non-core operations or held in reserves for longer term needs.*
- ✓ *Cash and property investments will be made to first protect and maintain principal and then to maximize returns. Liquidity of investments will align with capital and operating needs.*
- ✓ *Outsourcing of expertise will be supported if expertise is not available in-house; is project based; requires an independent assessment or opinion; or if there is a need to supplement the current workforce for a period of not more than six months.*
- ✓ *Reserves will be established and maintained to provide for stability of operations; asset replacement and renewal at the end of their useful life; growth obligations and statutory requirements.*
- ✓ *Infrastructure assets will be replaced once assets reach the end of their useful life and are no longer cost effective to operate and/or they impact health and safety. Notwithstanding a least cost approach applies that leverages senior government grants; combines projects for synergies (e.g. water, sewer and road replacements); and joint projects with other organizations.*

Policy 01-41-01 Asset Management provides guidance to ensure that Asset Management practices are integrated throughout the organization to maximize value from existing and new assets.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

Budget Process



Policy 08-11 [Appendix #1](#) guides the budget process of development, implementation, and evaluation. Budgeting takes place year-round starting with staff gathering information during the summer months. A detailed review of the Operating Budget, Road Plan and the Capital Replacement Plan takes place to ensure that the budgets are created based on the most up to date information. An interim budget must be approved by Council by December 31. Once the assessment is established in March, tax rates are discussed, and a final annual budget is approved. Council may amend the budget through motions as circumstances require.

The annual budget must be a balanced budget. The estimated revenue and transfers must be sufficient to pay the estimated expenditures and transfers not including amortization (MGA s.243).

The Alberta Municipal Government Act (MGA s.283.1) requires each municipality to prepare a written three-year financial plan and a five-year capital plan, and Council is required to update the financial plan each year as per MGA s.283.1(6). The current year's budget is used as a foundation and adjustments are made to future years to include inflation, changes in services, and expected capital requirements.

Public Consultation

Public Consultation took place in November & December 2022. The feedback was taken in consideration when preparing the final budget for 2023. An open house budget will be held late fall for all ratepayers. **Any time throughout the year, we welcome feedback through the following methods:**

Budget Overview

BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

Administration recommends that Smoky Lake County work towards full annual funding of operations, maintenance, growth, and asset depletion by applying the following measures:

- Ensure that the budget contains necessary inflationary increases to maintain services at a consistent level in future years.
- Set funds aside for long-term infrastructure needs and capital replacement.
- Continue to pursue new sources of revenue.
- Use new revenues to reduce tax rates only when they are assured, sustainable, and stable.
- Ensure that funding towards capital exceeds annual amortization so that the value of capital is not depleted.
- Work towards providing consistent funding for capital and infrastructure to avoid the tax rate fluctuations that will be required over the next four years.

BUDGET MESSAGE

The 2023-2027 budget is based on the level of services approved in the 2023 budget.

The budget has been prepared by administration with the following guidelines:



- **Inflation:** Alberta Budget 2023-2026 predicts a change in the Consumer Price Index to be 2024 2.2%, 2025 2.2%, 2026 2.2%, and 2027 2.2%. Smoky Lake County has used these percentages to predict our future budgets.
- **Wage and salary** increase are based on Union Contracts:
 - The 3-Year Collective Agreement with Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) Local 4575 expires December 31, 2024. Salaries will increase by \$0.55 per hour in 2023 and \$0.75 in 2024. The predicted inflation of 2.2 % is used to forecast payroll for 2025, 2026, and 2027.
 - The Collective Agreement with International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE Local 955) expires December 31, 2024. Wages are budgeted at 1% for 2023, 0% for 2024. The predicted inflation of 2.2 % is used to forecast payroll for 2025, 2026 , and 2027
- The **Capital** Plan approved by Council.
- The **Five-Year Road** Plan as approved by Council December 2022.
- No change to service levels in future years.
- There will be changes to the Municipal Sustainability grant in 2024. We do not know how these changes will impact grant funding; therefore, we have budgeted future based on the assumption that there is no change to grant amounts future years.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

The County has been able to maintain a solid financial position in spite of provincial economic challenges. With careful planning, we have minimized the impact of cost increases which include high inflation, ongoing downloading from the province, and decline in non residential assessment.

Provincial Downloading

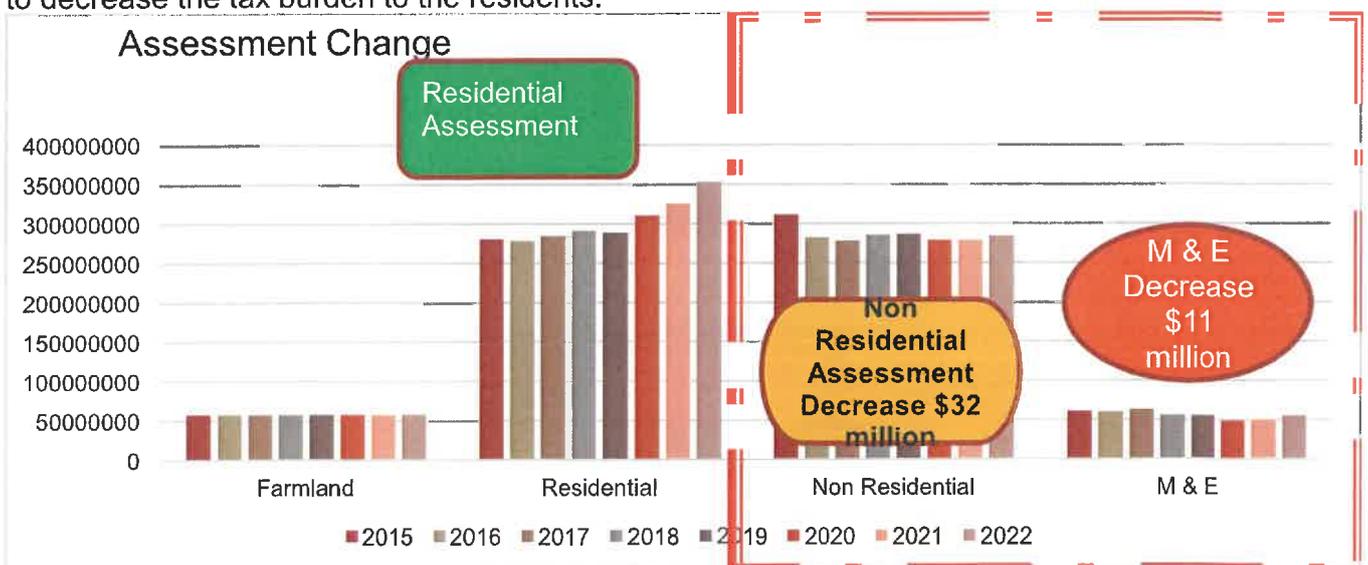
The downloading from the province includes increasing costs and decreasing grants.

- *Policing costs are being phased in over 4 years:*
 - 2020 \$ 62,702
 - 2021 \$ 95,621
 - 2022 \$127,404
 - 2023 \$191,242
- *Grant in lieu payments (property taxes for provincial owned land) are paid at a rate of 50%. This is a loss in revenue of \$30,000.*
- *The Municipal Sustainability Initiative has been decreased from \$1,579,000 in 2021 to \$640,324 in 2022. Although we have forecasted the grant to remain at \$640,000 per year for the next five years, the program will be changing in 2024.*

Assessment and Property Tax Challenges

Changes in the taxable assessment since 2015 have created a revenue challenge for Smoky Lake County. The 2015 taxable assessment peaked at \$750,573,000. Due to a substantial loss of oil and gas assessment, It declined to a low of \$678,340,340 in 2017 and has now recovered up to \$749,240,670 as a result of increased residential property values.

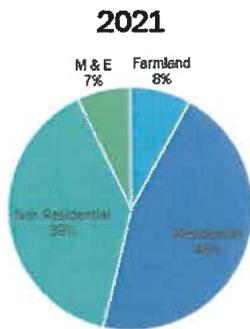
Property taxes are levied based on four categories: farmland, residential, non residential, and machinery equipment. Smoky Lake County relies heavily on non-residential and M & E tax revenue to decrease the tax burden to the residents.



The proportion of Residential assessment vs non-residential continues to increase

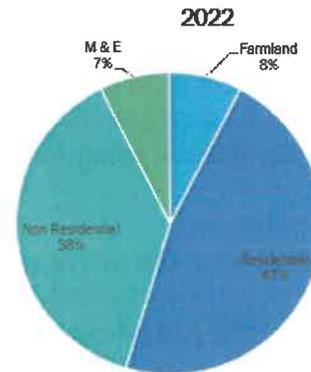
Residential Assessment:

This is significant because it creates a greater tax burden for the residential properties

In 2020 Council recognized the need to offset the declining tax revenue from Oil and Gas with a new revenue source such as tourism. The Victoria District Economic Development Strategy Business Plan Bylaw 1390-20 was passed in 2020. In 2022 both the Town of Smoky Lake and County established a Municipally Controlled Corporation and loans have been provided to allow the corporation to carry out the next steps. New Tourism business in the Smoky Lake region will provide new sources of assessment, create new jobs, and increase the population; thus, improving the Region’s long term sustainability. FUND STRUCTURE

The County has two funds, Municipal and Gas. The fund structure is used to ensure that costs for each fund are covered only by revenues belonging to that entity. Each fund is budgeted with a modified accrual basis of accounting, similar to the basis used to create the audited financial statements. Revenues and expenses are budgeted for in the year they will be accounted for. Grant revenues are budgeted in the year they will be used.

Municipal Fund

The municipal Fund is the primary fund used to manage the County's financial resources and obligations. All services are provided from this fund except for Natural Gas.

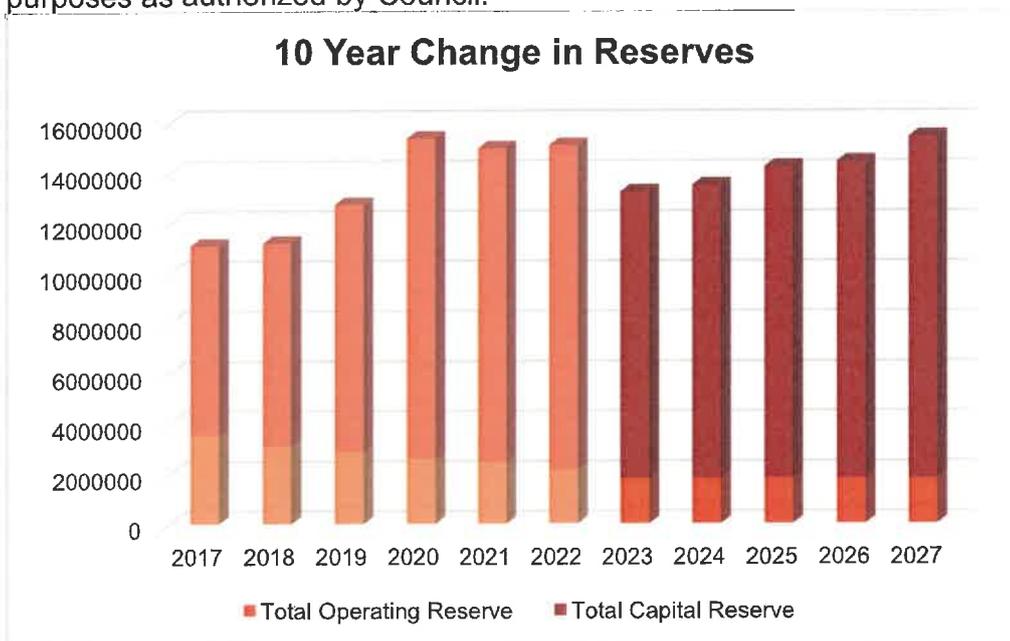
Natural Gas Fund

The Natural Gas Utility is a user pay utility that supplies natural gas to Smoky Lake County and Vilna properties. It is 100% funded through user fees.

Smoky Lake County Financial Statements are consolidated and therefore include the accounts of all funds held by the County. The Financial Statements are audited annually and are available to the public by April of the following year.

RESERVES AND SURPLUS

The County keeps reserve funds set aside to provide funding for future expenditures and to ensure sufficient funds are available when required, as well as, where possible, to avoid the need to incur debt. On the financial statements, they are referred to as restricted surplus. Unrestricted surplus consists of surplus funds that were the result of past budget surpluses and may be used for capital or operating purposes as authorized by Council.

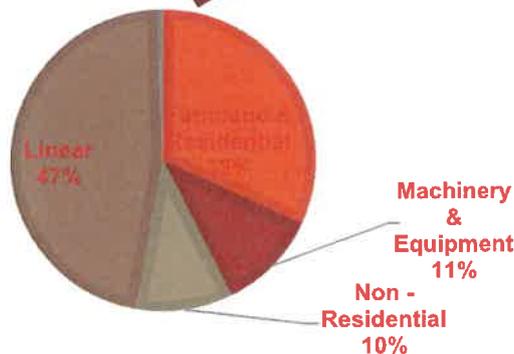
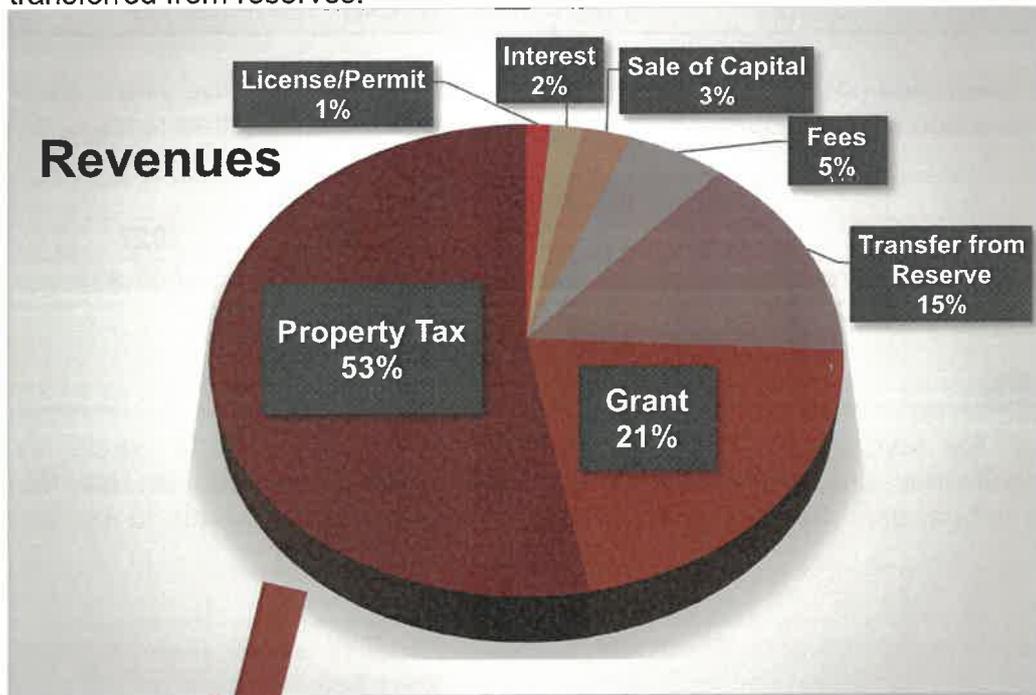
Revenues

Revenues for the County come from three main sources: Property Taxes, User Fees, and Grants

PROPERTY TAXES

Council considers the assessment, budget, and requisitions when setting the tax rate.

In 2023, the Net Property Taxes (Property Tax revenue less the Education and Seniors' Requisitions) will provide 53% of the total revenue. To keep the requirements for tax revenue lower again this year, funds will be transferred from reserves.



Property Tax revenue will provide \$10.2 million dollars. Most of the tax revenue comes from:

- ✓ Non-Residential
- ✓ Linear
- ✓ Machinery and Equipment.

Only 32% of the 10.2 million dollars comes from residential and farmland taxes. As other tax sources and grants have decreased, the need to rely on residential and farmland taxes has increased.

USER FEES

Municipal user fee revenue comes from water/sewer charges, sales of goods and services, campsite fees, and landfill fees. For 2023 the revenue budgeted from User fees (not including natural gas charges) is \$1,060,683. User fees are expected to increase with inflation.



GRANTS



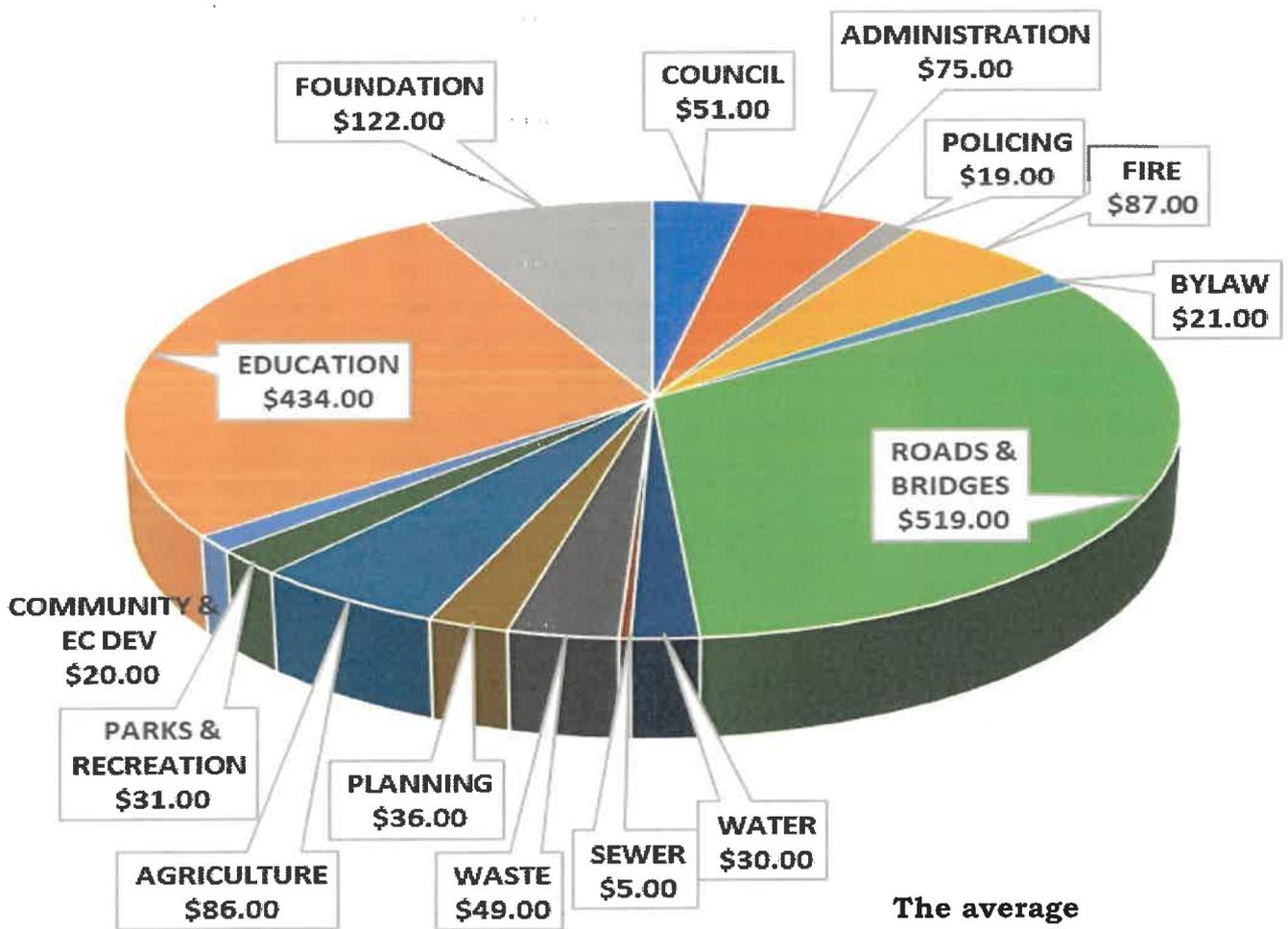
Estimated grants are included in the financial plan.

1. Annual grants like the Municipal Sustainability Initiative Grant (MSI) and the Federal Gas Tax Grant are conservatively estimated based on what was provided in the previous year. The MSI program will be replaced by the Local Government Fiscal Framework (LGFF) in 2024. We don't know how much to expect from the LGFF program, so we have left the budget amount the same as the MSI amount for 2023.
2. Specific grants for projects are estimated based on the current grant rules. If the County does not receive the grant, the project may be cancelled or postponed until further funding can be secured. As new grant programs become available, Council may make changes to the budgets to capitalize on the opportunities.

Expenses

Expenses are tracked per department. The “where do my tax dollars go” chart shows the portion of tax revenue that is allocated to each department.

The average residential property value is \$178,034 which results in an average total tax levy of \$1,585 (\$132.00 per month).

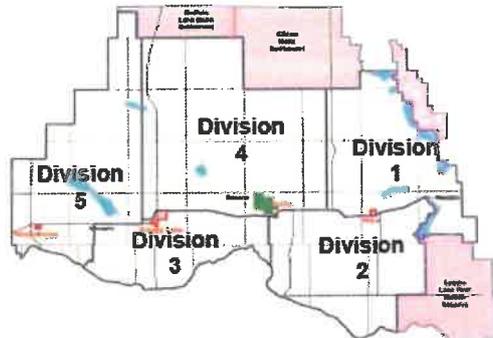
CAPITAL BUDGET

Topic: Assumption of Responsibility for Municipal Streetlights – Entrance to Village of Waskatenau

Presented By: Planning & Development Services

Recommendation(s):

That Smoky Lake County assume responsibility for payment of the electricity charges for the three (3) streetlights located on RGE RD 193A, between Highway 28 and the entrance to the Village of Waskatenau (Site IDs 0010465047210, 0010467850617, & 0010467861915) as an unbudgeted expense.

Background:

The Public Works Manager received an email, dated June 12, 2023, from ATCO Electric, regarding a series of streetlights located on RGE RD 193A at the entrance to the Village of Waskatenau. ATCO informed the PW Manager that these streetlights were located within the County boundary, despite the Village having been responsible for paying the electricity bills, and asking whether or not the County wished to assume responsibility for the lights.

The Planning and Development Manager investigated the matter further, confirming that a total of three (3) streetlights are located within the County. The P&D Manager obtained billing data from the Village (**Attachment #1**) with annual totals for the 3 lights as follows:

Site ID 0010465047210 = \$ 724.74

Site ID 0010467850617 = \$ 774.67

Site ID 0010467861915 = \$ 774.67

Total = **\$ 2274.08**

Subsequently, at the August 3, 2023 County Council meeting, the following motion was made:

Motion 777-23: *“That Smoky Lake County defer further discussion in respect to payment of the electricity charges for the three (3) streetlights located on Range Road 193A, between Highway 28 and the entrance to the Village of Waskatenau (identified under ATCO Electric Site IDs 0010465047210, 0010467850617, and 0010467861915), until further research is completed to confirm jurisdictional boundaries.”*

Section 18(2) of the *Municipal Government Act* states:

*"Subject to this or any other Act, a municipal district also has the direction, control and management of roads and road diversions surveyed for the purpose of opening a road allowance as a diversion from the road allowance on the **south** or west boundary of the district although the roads or road diversions are outside of the boundaries of the municipal district."*

Furthermore, the *Traffic Safety Act* expands on the municipality's responsibilities/authorities. Section 110 of the *Traffic Safety Act* states:

"A road authority may, in respect of a highway over which it has direction, control and management, place, erect or otherwise display traffic control devices at any location on, over or adjacent to the highway for the purposes of controlling and regulating traffic..."

Furthermore, the Section 1(mm)(ii) of the *Traffic Safety Act* defines a "road authority" as:

"in the case of a highway that is under the direction, control and management of a municipality, the council of the municipality".

Furthermore, the Section 1(ss) of the *Traffic Safety Act* defines a "traffic control device" as:

"any signal, marking or device placed, marked or erected under the authority of this Act for the purpose of regulating, warning or guiding traffic."

The above noted sections from the *Municipal Government Act* and the *Traffic Safety Act* indicate that Smoky Lake County has jurisdiction over both RGE RD 193A and the portion of 53rd Avenue, and that the streetlights located along these roadways are under the direction, control and management of the County.

Benefits: Maintain public safety and security.

Disadvantages: Additional costs incurred for electricity.

Alternatives: Choose not to assume responsibility for the lights

Financial Implications: The cost of providing electricity to all 3 of the streetlights is approximately \$2,275/year.

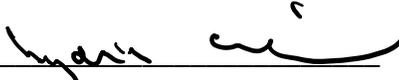

Background:

- The Environment & Parks Manager met on site with Mr. Ken Warholik of Kortech Ltd. who advised that a grader/groomer would be required to touch up the 200-meter stretch before the product is sprayed on the sites sandy material.

This would be a good opportunity to see if this test strip would be an advantage to lower the dust coming from the trail and may be determined if we would apply dust suppression where the trail goes through other hamlets throughout the County in the future.

The application would help alleviate dust complaints from Edwand residents.

The County of Minburn, a municipal district in east central Alberta, Canada has its municipal office located in the Town of Vegreville.

Tourists heading east just outside of Vegreville on Highway 16A is the internationally recognized Rotary Peace Park offering a large picnic area, shelter with a fireplace and a covered BBQ area that can be reserved for private functions. On the southside of Highway 16 by Vegreville you can enjoy many species of birds while fishing at the Rainbow Park Reservoir. This scenic parcel of land boasts a man-made lake stocked with trout. The Akasu Hill, further east, is a historical site encompassing both Akasu Lake and Akasu Hill. The Hill was a rest stop for native tribes and is the highest geodetic elevation on the Yellowhead Highway between Edmonton and Winnipeg, Manitoba (2500 ft. above sea level). The Wapasu Recreation Conservancy Park near Innisfree and Wapasu Lake is a known migratory stop for white swans and countless wildlife species. Trails developed to the summit of the natural elevation that provide a panoramic view of the lake, and surrounding area for nature enthusiasts and day-users are able to enjoy the recreational area along the southeast shores of the lake.

KIKINO METIS SETTLEMENT

Kikino Metis Settlement is a Metis settlement in central Alberta, Canada within Smoky Lake County. It is located along Highway 36, approximately 128 km (80 mi) west of Cold Lake. Kikino is one of 8 of the Metis Settlements.

Located in northeast Alberta, Kikino Metis Settlement has over 1,100 members living on close to 44,000 square hectares of land. The settlement shares a boundary with nearby Buffalo Lake Metis Settlement and is approximately 128 km west of Cold Lake.

Kikino Metis Settlement has a post office, general store with gas and food service, health unit, portable water delivery, volunteer fire department and the Kikino Silver Birch Resort and Campground. The local economy is diverse and focuses on construction, ranching, aggregate sales, tourism and has benefitted from its forestry resources and in exploration and development of oil and gas.

Recreation and community activities include hockey, baseball, soccer, dance, and a family literacy program. The settlement is home to various Métis performers and musicians. The well-known youth dance group Kikino Northern Lights Dancers are recognized as some of the best traditional Métis dancers and jiggers in Canada. Kikino Métis Elders founded the group in 1978, after identifying a need to teach youth traditional music and dance.

Kikino Metis Settlement hosts annual events including the Kikino Silver Birch Rodeo and Celebration Days, Kikino Slo-Pitch Tourney and the Métis Triathlon.

FORT McMURRAY WOOD BUFFALO



Fort McMurray, an urban service area in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo in Alberta, is 435 km (270mi) northeast of Edmonton on Highway 63, about 60 km (37 mi) west of the Saskatchewan border. Nestled in the middle of the Athabasca oil sands, surrounded by boreal forest at the confluence of the Athabasca River, the Clearwater River, the Hangingstone River, and the Horse River, it sits at 370 m (1,210 ft) above sea level. Fort McMurray is the largest community in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo and has played a significant role in the development of the national petroleum industry and is considered one of the hubs of this industry.

The array of exotic trees include European Aspen, Blue Spruce and Sand Cherry. The MacDonald Island Park is a recreational center that holds the library, indoor waterpark, basketball, tennis and squash courts, rock climbing, fitness centre, indoor playground, and ice rinks.
