- May 16 attended the Evergreen Regional Waste Management commission with alternate Lorne Halisky, information on the ACP grant St. Paul county would accept the position of proposed waste management in Evergreen region and will be applying on all the municipalities behalf & managing the grant, a RFP for auditing services will be sent out to several accounting firms, Ashley gave the financial report some GIC's are due and will be reinvested, Paul gave the site report the loader needs some new tires so we went over some quotes we received and he will do some more research into prices, the new employee Dakota started and he is available to work landfills in other municipalities for 21.65

per hour plus travel allowance, steel gates have been stolen in St. Paul grazing reserve next door to Evergreen site, the site is in good shape the Boscombe 4H club with 30 parents & members they cleaned all scavenge garbage within the boundary & received 2,000 dollars for their club, work on the inert waste cell has been given approval & July 2 is the start date with a preconstruction meeting in mid-June, A & F Metal interested in hauling metal waste from Lafond site at 160.00 per ton, next meeting June 20, 10:00 am.

April 25, 2024 - Assessing the Viability of Smaller Municipalities - 5:30 p.m. - via Zoom

This discussion is on the final paper in the Future of Municipal Government series in partnership
with the University of Calgary. The webinar will focus on the paper's findings, highlight what
influences the viability of small communities, and provide policy tools to address these
challenges.

May 13, 2024 - Muni-Corr - St. Paul County Chambers -10:00 a.m.

Bylaw update - Five municipalities have approved. Town of Smoky Lake still has some issues with wording. Marianne to attend as a delegation. MD of Bonnyville had a few changes, but consensus is that they be filed until bylaw is next reviewed. County of St. Paul has rebuilt road to Edouardville and had taken .0333 hectare. County has also reinforced Texas gate. Question asked if Muni-Corr wants to get paid for that portion of road (voted that no payment required by County). Muni-Corr will look at a process for ATV use on trail in the event of a drought/fire situation and with consult with all municipalities. Don Millhouse has made a request for access on Muni-Corr property in Vilna - request for more information, deferred to next meeting. Glendon vehicles have been using the Iron Horse Trail as a road. RRTS will install signs and use enforcement to deter this. Cameras will also be installed.



That Smoky Lake County Council amend Policy Statement No. 08-19-02: Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council Program – LEGAL HOST AGREEMENT, to update the County's Chief Administrative Officer's (CAO's) name to the current CAO.

Background:

The County has been committed to Community Learning Council (CLC) for the past 48 years. CLC was previously known as "Smoky Lake Further Education Council" which was originally established in 1975 through the County of Smoky Lake's School Board of Education, and after the Board dissolved in 1995, the Designated Hosting Authority became the County of Smoky Lake No. 13 (municipal name changed to "Smoky Lake County" in 1999).

Policy Statement No. 08-19: Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council Program – LEGAL HOST AGREEMENT, was established in 2017 to formalize the relationship between CLC and the County under a Municipal Legal Host Model agreement, as required by Alberta Advanced Education.

This means that Smoky Lake County receives the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) grant on behalf of CLC and according to the CALP guidelines, the County must: ensure compliance with the legal and operational requirements, act as the legal employer of individuals hired to administer the CALP, act as the legal financial administrator for the CALP grant, provide a representative to serve as a member on CLC, ensure the employer, financial, and program responsibilities of both the legal host and CLC are clearly articulated in written form (e.g. Legal Host Agreement) and submitted to the Alberta Advanced Education department, and lastly, insure the operations of CLC under a contract of general liability insurance, in an amount of not less than \$2,000,000 inclusive per occurrence.

The policy needs to be updated under Schedule "A": Legal Host Agreement, to reflect the County's new Chief Administrative Officer: Kevin Lucas, who was appointed on May 23, 2024.

Benefits:

Clearly demonstrates the County's relationship to CLC through Policy formalizing the framework for the continued fostering of lifelong adult foundational learning within our community with defined roles and responsibilities.

1. STATEMENT:

- 1.1 Smoky Lake County officiates as the LEGAL HOST (Local Hosting Authority) for the Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council since January 1, 1995: a change in Designated Hosting Authority to Smoky Lake County from previously known as Smoky Lake Further Education which was originally established in November 17, 1975 under the County of Smoky Lake School Board of Education.
- 1.2 Smoky Lake County as the Legal Host and Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) grant recipient for the **Service Organization** Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council.

2. OBJECTIVE:

- 2.1 The intention of this Policy is to demonstrate the accountability and effectiveness of the Legal Host model for the Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council that contributes to the effective delivery of Literacy and Foundational Learning programming and support in our community.
- 2.2 To establish adequate clarity and documentation with regard to the expectations, roles and responsibilities and build an understanding relationship between both parties of the continuity of the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) with the Smoky Lake Region.

3. **DEFINITION**:

- 3.1 **"Chief Administrative Officer"** is the person appointed by Council as the Chief Administrative Officer pursuant of the *Municipal Government Act*.
- 3.2 Her Majesty the Queen in Right of Alberta: is the Minister of Alberta Advanced Education.
- 3.3 <u>Legal Host:</u> is the Smoky Lake County, as a legal entity approved by Advanced Education to act as the legal administrator for a Service Organization, and receive the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) Grants on behalf of the Service Organization.
- 3.4 **Service Organization:** Is the Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council.

In this capacity the County's responsibilities are as outlined in the **Government of Alberta**, **Advanced Education – Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) Guidelines**, dated July 2016, and as amended from time to time.

Responsibilities of the County an Incorporated Legal Host:

A Legal Host is a member of the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) and is approved by the Minister to receive Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) funding on behalf of the Council. The responsibilities of a **Legal Host** are:

- 1. To act as the legal employer of individuals hired to administer the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) in the community and continue to provide employee benefit and payroll services.
- 2. To act as the legal financial administrator for Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) grant funds and ensure that the Community Adult Learning Program funds can be accounted for distinctly and separately from other funds received and conduct an annual review of the financial records on the basis as per Council fiscal year.
- 3. Provide a representative to serve as a member on the Council as a decision-making body.
- 4. To provide commercial general liability insurance coverage of not less than \$2,000,000.00 inclusive per occurrence, insuring against Bodily Injury, Personal Injury, and Property Damage, including lose of use, which will automatically fall under the County's main Liability Insurance Policy that will cover the Council and activities involved in the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) in the community.
- 5. Provide Office and Meeting Space, IT Support Services, Photocopying Services and Postage Services (not bulk mailing) at no cost to the Council.
- 6. Provide County Cell Phone Coverage Plan at no cost. Cell Phone usage costs shall be reimbursed to the County.
- 7. To protect the personal information of learners in the collection, use and disclosure of information as stipulated in the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FOIP) and Protection of Individual Privacy Act (PIPA) and accommodate all formal requests.
- 8. This "Legal Host Agreement" shall be considered as a clearly articulated written form that demonstrates Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) funds are provided to a Legal Host and ensures that the status of the employer, financial and program responsibilities of both the Legal Host and the Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council are agreed to by both parties and any amendments thereafter shall be submitted to the Department.

Please note: Should any party representative change upon the execution of the agreement – a new Legal Host Agreement shall be executed.

Responsibilities of Council as the Service Organization:

As an eligible Service Organization of the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) and is approved by the Minister to be funded by Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) funding on behalf of the County. <u>The responsibilities of the Service Organization are:</u>

- 1. To operate as an effective non-for-profit Service Organization with sound practices in governance and in the planning and management of its programs, finances, and personnel; and oversees the direct learning opportunities enabled and be in compliance with the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) Grant and Guidelines.
- 2. Determine bylaws, structure and decision-making processes, and develop and adhere to operational policies and procedures, including conflict of interest guidelines, and examine and vote on matters in accordance to the written bylaws, policies and procedures of Council.
- 3. Ensure that the decision-making body consists of at least five (5) individuals from within the Community, including a representative of the Legal Host. No represented employer or organization can have more than one vote on the decision-making body, including the Legal Host.
- 4. Hold regular meetings and maintain a record of minutes documenting key decision made including personnel, program and funding allocations. Records Retention shall be in accordance with Council Policy.
- 5. Develop and submit annual grant applications and final reports, including financial statements, in a format specified by the Department, and approved by the Legal Host.
- 6. Ensure the learning opportunities, supports, and services supported by the Community Adult Learning Program meet needs, benefit learners, are provided in a cost-effective manner to maximize the use of public funds, and are provided in cooperation with other related organizations in the Community and provide the Legal Host at Council year-end with an Annual Summation Report of Programs and Courses.
- 7. Ensure criteria are in place for reducing the social and economic barriers facing learners and processes are in place for learners to participate in programs and courses.
- 8. Act as the main legal employer of individuals hired to administer the Community Adult Learning Program (CALP), and consult the Legal Host as necessary with documentation.
- 9. Act as the main legal financial administrator for Community Adult Learning Program (CALP) grant funds and ensure that the Community Adult Learning Program funds can be accounted for distinctly and separately from other funds received on an annually review basis as per Council fiscal year. Provide two Financial Statements and an Excel Spreadsheet Report to the Legal Host: one for the month of June and one for the month of December for the County's fiscal year.
- 10. Keep the Legal Host and the Department informed of changes to the current Council relationship and signing authorizes; and ensure the Department has current copies of bylaws, financial and personnel policies and procedures provided annually at Council's year-end.
- 11. Ensure that all staff and volunteers who work with or may have unsupervised access to children must provide the Council a current security clearance/criminal record check available through the local police department; and provide the original copy to the Legal Host.
- 12. Acknowledge that programs and services were made possible by funding from the **Government of Alberta** on all materials including the following, but not limited to that are printed and created, such as advertising, signage, brochures, Flyers, website, etc.
- 13. Smoky Lake County Community Learning Council requires for its record documentation acknowledging that Smoky Lake County will continue to serve as the Legal Host for our Council and upon the execution of the "Legal Host Agreement", it shall be considered as a written form that Smoky Lake County as the Legal Host demonstrates commitment to lifelong foundational learning which is greatly appreciated.

Annually, the Planning and Development Department conducts a review of its fees and charges and compares them against other municipalities in the region to ensure that its fees remain competitive. Fees/charges were compared with the following municipalities:

- County of Two Hills; and
- County of St. Paul.

March 5, 2024 Smoky Lake County Committee of the Whole Meeting

Results of the compassion were discussed at the March 5, 2024, and April 17, 2024, Committee of the Whole meetings, where the following recommending Motion was made:

Motion 521-24:

"That Smoky Lake County Council recommends the Planning and Development Fees Bylaw be brought forward to a future Council meeting for consideration of changing the fee for discretionary development, to be 20% paid upon application with the remainder of the fee paid when approval has been granted, as an incentive to decrease the developer's initial investment and encourage entrepreneurs to take a chance when there is no guarantee of approval, and to encourage development by making it easier for businesses to propose discretionary developments and by reducing the developer's cost of property taxes during the first few years which can substantially impact the success or failure of a new business."



The Planning and Development Department has prepared proposed Bylaw No. 1463-24 based on the discussion during these Committee meetings.

Benefits: Ensure that the County's Planning and Development related fees/charges remain competitive with other municipalities throughout the region; provide greater cost certainty to prospective developers by charging the majority of fees after approval of a Development permit has been granted; reduce risk for prospective developers; and encourage investment in the County.

Disadvantages: Staff time required to administer fees being charged separately.

Alternatives: Keep existing Bylaw No. 1431-23 or amend proposed Bylaw No. 1463-24.

SMOKY LAKE COUNTY IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA BYLAW NO. 1463-24

A BYLAW OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF SMOKY LAKE COUNTY IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, TO ESTABLISH FEES FOR PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT RELATED MATTERS FOR SMOKY LAKE COUNTY.

WHEREAS Smoky Lake County deems it expedient to set and review, as necessary, from time-to-time, various fees, charges and fines related to planning and development within the Municipality; and

WHEREAS Council has adopted Smoky Lake County Bylaw 1272-14, as amended, to be the Land Use Bylaw;

WHERAS Council may in a bylaw provide for a system of licences, permits or approvals, including establishing fees for licences, permits and approvals, in accordance with Section 8 of the *Municipal Government Act*, R.S.A. 2000, c. M-26, and amendments thereto;

WHEREAS, the Safety Codes Act, R.S.A. 2000, c. S-1, as amended from time to time, authorizes an accredited municipality to make bylaws respecting fees for anything issued or any material or service provided pursuant to the Safety Codes Act;

NOW THEREFORE under the authority and subject to the provisions of the Municipal Government Act, and by virtue of all other enabling powers, the Council of Smoky Lake County, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

1. NAME:

a. This Bylaw may be referred to as the "Smoky Lake County Planning and Development Fees Bylaw."

2. FEES ESTABLISHED

- a. "Schedule A Plenning & Development Fees"
- b. (Schedule B Safety Code Feet)
- c. "Schedule C Subdivision Fees"

attached herein, each forms a part of this Bylaw.

- d. The Subdivision Authority under the Municipal Government Act as appointed by Council may establish related fees.
- The Accredited Agency under the Safety Codes Act as appointed by Council may establish related fees

3. FINES RELATED TO OFFENCES AND PENALITIES

- Any person who:
 - Contravenes or falls to comply with any provision of this Bylaw and/or the Smoky Lake County Land Use Bylaw 1274-12 the "Land Use Bylaw";
 - Uses land in a manner contrary to the provisions of this Bylaw or any subdivision or development permit for such land;
 - iii. Contravenes or falls to comply with any development permit or subdivision approval, or conditions forming part thereof;
 - (v. Contravenes or falls to comply with a decision of the Intermunicipal Subdivision and Development Appeal Board;
 - Obstructs or otherwise hinders in any manner any person in the exercise or performance of that person's powers authorized under this or any other Bylaw or enactment; or,
 - vi. Contravenes or falls to comply with a Stop Order Issued pursuant to the Municipal Government Act:



is guilty of an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine.

- b. A person who contravenes or who fails to comply with any other provision of the Land Use Bylaw is guilty of an offence and is liable to a penalty for a first and each subsequent offence in the amount specified in Schedule A of this Bylaw.
- c. If a person is found guilty of an offence under the Land Use Bylaw, the court may, in addition to any other penalty imposed, order the person to comply with the Land Use Bylaw or a development permit issued under that Bylaw, or a condition of any of them.
- d. A Peace Officer may issue a Municipal Tag where it is reasonably determined that a person has contravened any provision of the Land Use Bylaw.
- Where a contravention or offence is of a continuing nature, further Municipal Tags may be issued
 by a Peace Officer for each day the offence continues.
- f. A person named on a Municipal Tag may, in lieu of being prosecuted, plead gullty to the offence by signing the Municipal Tag and paying the specified penalty at the location indicated on the Municipal Tag.
- g. If payment of a Municipal Tag is not made within the time specified, a Peace Officer may issue a Violation Ticket under the Provincial Offences Procedures Act requiring the person named to appear in court on the date indicated in the Violation Ticket.
- h. Nothing in this Bylaw shall prevent or restrict a Peace Officer from immediately issuing a Violation Ticket under the Provincial Offences Procedures Act for a mandatory court appearance of any person who contravenes this Bylaw or the Land Use Bylaw.

4. RIGHT OF ENTRY

a. For the purpose of entering and inspecting land or structures as described under Part 13, Division 4, Section 542 of the Municipal Government Act, RSA 2000, Chapter M-26 as amended, a Development Officer or the Development Compliance Officer, and any other persons appointed by Council, are hereby declared to be "designated officers".

5. REVIEW

a. This Bylaw should be reviewed at least every two years from its adoption, or as deemed necessary from time to time.

6. PREVAILANCE

 To the extent that a provision of this bylaw is found to conflict with another bylaw or policy of Smoky Lake County, this bylaw shall prevail.

7. REPEAL & SEVERABILITY:

- a. Bylaw 1431-23 is repealed, upon adoption of this bylaw.
- b. If any part of this Bylaw is found to be invalid, it is the intention of Council that the remaining sections remain in force until repealed or otherwise amended.

8. EFFECTIVE DATE:

a. This Bylaw comes into force and effect upon it receiving Third Reading.







Option #1:

That Smoky Lake County continue to encourage residents to access editions of the County Grapevine on the Smoky Lake County website, as the website remains as the County's primary and predominant online presence, as outlined in Policy No. 01-46-02: Social Media; and continue to promote when new editions of the Grapevine are published on social media.

Option #2:

That Smoky Lake County provide an option to the public for receiving the County Grapevine by email to anyone who requests to receive it; and notify the public of this new distribution option by promoting it on the County's social media, website and Grapevine.

Background:

Councillor Fenerty requested that Smoky Lake County provide an option for the public to sign up and receive the monthly Smoky Lake County Grapevine via email. Email distribution would be provided by Smoky Lake County and the email list would be managed by Smoky Lake County Communications.

Since the closure of the Smoky Lake Signal in 2021, the Grapevine is only published in the Redwater Review. The Redwater Review is distributed to all TOA 3PO (Waskatenau), TOA 3LO (Vilna) and TOA 3CO (Smoky Lake) postal codes at no cost to residents (distribution information provided by the Redwater Review, as of March 2024. The Redwater Review is also published online at www.redwaterreview.com.

The Smoky Lake County Grapevine is posted on the County website the same day it is published in the Redwater Review. Accessing the Grapevine online is easy with just 2-clicks to access, well within the '3-click' website rule, where users should always be able to find their desired information within three clicks or less. The Grapevine can be found under the Government heading → Grapevine. Archived editions of the Grapevine are also available online. The Grapevine is emailed to all staff, Council, the Town of Smoky Lake and Villages of Waskatenau and Vilna.

Benefits:

- Increase accessibility of the Grapevine
- More cost effective than going through a third-party email distribution host

Disadvantages:

- Time to manage an email distribution list of subscribers and unsubscribes becomes complex as the list grows
- Storing subscriber data comes with a responsibility to keep it secure. Any data breaches could result in loss of trust and legal consequences.



- Municipalities must comply with Canada's Anti-Spam Legislation (CASL) which imposes strict regulations on commercial electronic messages (CEMs), including email newsletters. Non-compliance with CASL can result in fines. CASL mandates that senders obtain explicit consent from recipients before sending them commercial electronic messages. Municipalities must ensure that subscribers have opted in to receive newsletters and provide a clear unsubscribe mechanism in every communication.
- We do not currently have the ability for an unsubscribe button with our email system.

Alternatives:

 Use a third party host for mass email distribution. This comes with a cost and have limited control over certain aspect of email distribution, such as server configurations, delivery protocols and security measures. Must ensure that the service provider adheres to relevant regulations and safeguards to protect subscribers' information.

May have lawyer fees to ensure a good privacy statement is created.

- 2. That Smoky Lake County accept the final report for Smoky Lake County Wildfire Mitigation Strategy prepared by Montane Forest Management Ltd, consultant Stew Walkinshaw dated May 2024 outlining the implementation plan of recommendations. (recommendations will be listed in the motions)
- 3. Upon today's discussion a motion to determine which recommendations the surplus of \$3,572.90 shall be applied to.

Background:

Smoky Lake County received confirmation for the successful FRIAA FireSmart Program Project Grant application – Smoky Lake County Wildfire Mitigation Strategy for Lake Resort Communities in the amount of \$40,000.00 on December 9, 2022 – Motion 370-23: February 15, 2023.

Smoky Lake County contracted Montane Forest Management to complete the project in March of 2023.

Due to the wildfires in Alberta in 2023, Montane Forest Management was not able to start the Smoky Lake County project until October of 2023 which delayed our final reporting for December 31, 2023 grant deadline.

Smoky Lake County received a draft copy of the report in April of 2024 and a final copy in May 2024.

With delays to the original timelines Smoky Lake County applied for a grant extension to complete this project by September 30, 2024.

On May 29, 2024, Smoky Lake County submitted the progress report to FRIAA outlining the Wildfire Mitigation Strategy with the expenses from the contractor totaling \$36,427.10.

The Wildfire Mitigation Strategy report has provided 12 recommendations for Smoky Lake County to implement. Thess recommendations require future planning for finance budgeting and resources. However, there is a grant surplus balance of \$3,572.90 and administration suggesting to allocate the remaining grant funding towards under Vegetation Management for private lands - Recommendation 1: Educate and encourage residents in all of the resort communities to establish adequate FireSmart immediate and intermediate zone vegetation management standards on their private lands and under Public Education: FireSmart Hazard Assessments - Recommendation 6: Idenitfy and train Smoky Lake County Fire Department members to provide advanced FireSmart hazard assessments and options to reduce the wildfire threat to those residences that request them.

Currently there are no new funding opportunities from the FRIAA at this time.



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1 Introduction

The Smoky Lake County Wildfire Mitigation Strategy was developed to provide practical and operational wildland/urban interface risk mitigation strategies to reduce the threat of wildfire to development in twelve resort communities within Smoky Lake County.

The project objectives include:

- Assess wildfire hazard and risk to development
- Based on interface hazard and risk, develop and prioritize recommendations to reduce the threat of wildfire to development in the planning area

This Wildfire Mitigation Strategy (WFMS) was developed using standardized FireSmart hazard assessment protocols and mitigation measures were developed based on the seven disciplines of wildland/urban interface approach and current research and knowledge in interface community protection.

An implementation plan is included in this Plan to assist Smoky Lake County to budget and complete projects based on the priorities identified. FireSmart mitigation measures recommended in this strategy reduce, but do not remove, the threat of wildfire to communities.


This plan should be reviewed and updated at <u>five-year intervals</u> to ensure it is based on current conditions.

2 Planning Area

The planning area includes the following resort communities (Map 1):

- Hanmore Lake Resort
- Haines Estates
- Mons Lake Estates/Mons View Resort
- Sandy Lane Park
- Bonnie Lake Resort
- Birchland Resort
- Parkview Beach Resort
- Sunrise Beach/Garner Lake Resorts
- Hillside Acres
- Paradise Cove Resort
- Whitefish Lake Resort

The area consists of private, Municipal, and Provincial-lands. Jurisdictional authority for development, structure fire, and wildland fire are the responsibility of Smoky Lake County.




3 Hazard & Risk Assessment

Hazard and risk are assessed using wildfire incidence and wildfire behaviour potential to quantify overall wildfire threat to developments and to determine priorities for FireSmart mitigation actions.

3.1 Wildfire Incidence

Smoky Lake County wildfire data (2018-2021) indicates that the County fire department responded to 63 wildfires. Fire causes included arson, farm equipment, UTV, and powerlines. Provincial large wildfire data (1997-2022) shows a total of three wildfires greater than 200 hectares within the planning area during the spring season (April-June 15) with the 2002 Bellis Lake wildfire resulting in the loss of one dwelling, one cabin, and several outbuildings (Map 2). The majority of wildfires occur during the spring cured-grass season.




3.2 Wildfire Behaviour Potential

Wildfire behaviour potential is assessed using provincial fire weather indices data and wildland fuel types.

- Fire weather data from 2015 to 2023 from the Smoky Lake Auto (SLA) weather station is used to determine average number of "spread-event days" per year and the predominant wind direction and speed on those days. A "spread-event" day is defined as "a day when the fire actively spreads with high intensity" which corresponds to a Fire Weather Index value of 19 or higher (Podur & Wotton, 2011).
- Wildland fuel types from the provincial Fire Behaviour Prediction (FBP) fuel grid were used and wildfire behaviour potential for each fuel type was applied (Table 1).


3.2.1 Fire Weather

An average of 35 "spread-event days" per year occur with 43% of those days during the spring season (April-June 15). The predominant and strongest winds on those days are from the southeast (Figure 1).



3.2.2 Wildland Fuel Types

Wildland fuel types (Map 3) north of Highway 28 are primarily deciduous (D-1), deciduous dominated mixedwood (M-1DC), and cultivated crop/pasture/hay lands (VNF/O-1) with scattered patches of mature spruce (C-2) and jack pine (C-3/C-4).



3.2.3 Wildfire Behaviour Potential

Wildland/urban interface structures are often ignited by one or more of the following (Beverly et al., 2010):

- Radiant heat from hazardous wildland fuels less than 30 metres from the structure;
- Short-range ember transport from hazardous wildland fuels less than 100 metres from the structure, and/or;
- Long-range ember transport from hazardous wildland fuels less than 500 metres from the structure.

Wildfire behaviour potential up to 500m from each resort community is evaluated and relative wildfire behaviour potential classes were assigned to each fuel type based on anticipated wildfire behaviour type under spread-event day conditions (Maps 4A-4J):

- Low surface fire potential only
- Moderate surface fire with candling/torching and short-range ember transport potential
- High surface fire with intermittent to continuous crown-fire and long-range ember transport potential



Wildfire threat classes (Table 1) may be used to assist with setting priorities for mitigative actions.

Birchland Resort

- Main wildfire threat is from surface and crown fire in boreal spruce (C-2) and mixedwood (M-1) fuels with heavy dead/down and dead standing deciduous
- Fuels to the north, south, and east are primarily deciduous (D-1) and cultivated crop/hay fields (O-1)



- Highest wildfire threat is from dense Jack pine (C-3) with continuous ladder fuels within the community
- Boreal spruce (C-2) and mixedwood (M-1CD) on south-side of Edward Creek presents long-range spotting potential into the community




Map 4E - Wildfire Behaviour Potential







4 Vegetation Management Options

FireSmart guidelines recommend vegetation management within the Home Ignition Zone to reduce the threat of wildfire to the structure and/or structure fire to the wildland. The Home Ignition Zone consists of the Immediate Zone (Structure and 0-1.5m from structure), Intermediate Zone (1.5-10m from structure), and Extended Zone (10-30m+ from structure).



Vegetation management options are proposed to reduce the threat of wildfire to developed areas however they do not ensure structure survival under all hazard conditions.

4.1 Proposed Vegetation Management.

FireSmart vegetation management is proposed at two-levels:

- **Private-Lot** Privately-owned lands within 30 metres of structures (Immediate, Intermediate, and Extended Zones)
- Neighbourhood Municipal and Provincial-owned lands within 100 metres of developed areas (Extended Zone)

4.1.1 Private-Lot Fuelbreak Standards

Adequate clearance from wildland and/or ornamental landscaping fuels on private lands within 10 metres of the structure is lacking for many of the structures in all of the resort communities..

Items in the privately-owned Immediate, Intermediate, and Extended Zones (0-30m+) not meeting FireSmart standards include:

- Combustible surface cover including unmaintained native grass, needles, and/or leaves
- Combustible materials and landscaping including outbuildings, firewood piles, coniferous shrubs, and bark mulch
- Combustible natural and planted conifer trees (spruce, pine, fir)









FireSmart vegetation management guidelines for the Immediate and Intermediate Zones recommend:

- Establishment of a 1.5 metre non-combustible buffer around the outer footprint of the structure
- Removal of flammable forest vegetation within 10 metres and reduction of flammable forest vegetation from 10-30+ metres from the structure
- Removal of all coniferous ladder fuels (limbs) to a minimum height of 2 metres from ground level on residual coniferous trees
- Removal of all combustible material piles (firewood, lumber, etc.) within 10 metres
- Regular maintenance to ensure that grass is irrigated and mowed to less than 4cm height and all
 combustible needles, leaves, and native grass are removed from on and within 10 metres around
 structures

Recommendation 1: Educate and encourage residents in all of the resort communities to establish adequate FireSmart Immediate and Intermediate Zone vegetation management standards on their private-lands.

4.1.2 Neighbourhood Fuelbreak Standards

Municipal and Provincial-owned lands within 100m of the resort communities that are rated with Moderate to High wildfire behaviour potential have been proposed for FireSmart vegetation management (Table 2 & Maps 5A-5F). FireSmart guidelines recommend:

- Reduction and/or removal of flammable forest vegetation
- Pruning of all limbs on residual evergreen trees to a minimum height of 2 metres at lowest point from ground level
- Removal of all dead standing and dead and down forest vegetation from the forest floor
- Regular maintenance to ensure that all flammable regrowth, dead and down and dead standing are removed


Prior to implementation, **detailed FireSmart vegetation management prescriptions** must be developed for each area to determine treatment types and methods, unit boundaries, and sensitive areas.













4.2 Vegetation Management Maintenance

Landowners and land managers must provide periodic inspections of fuel modification areas and complete maintenance as required. Fuel modification maintenance is required at different timelines depending on many factors.

Immediate and Intermediate Zones (0-10 metres from structure) – must be maintained regularly throughout the year including:

- Irrigating and mowing grass
- Removal of dead needles/leaves and combustible debris piles on and around structures

Extended Zone (10-30+ metres from structure) – should be maintained when required including:

- Removal of dead and down and dead standing trees
- Thinning/removal of re-growth after original fuel reduction

Recommendation 3: Ensure that residents are educated and engaged on Immediate and Intermediate Zone FireSmart vegetation management maintenance and that Extended Zone FireSmart vegetation management area maintenance is planned, budgets are allocated, and projects are implemented.

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5 Development and Legislation Options

Consideration of wildfire at the development planning stage is encouraged to ensure that wildfire hazard is identified and the appropriate mitigation measures are developed and implemented prior to construction.

5.1 Structural Options


Structural characteristics that contribute to a structure's ability to withstand wildfire ignition include exterior roofing, siding, and decking materials and proper construction and maintenance of eaves, vents, and openings to reduce the threat of airborne ember ignition of the structure.

Roofing materials primarily consist of ignition-resistant asphalt-shingle or metal with scattered dwellings having combustible old, curled asphalt-shingle roofing materials.

Siding materials consist primarily of combustible wood or vinyl or ignition-resistant stucco, metal, or fibre-cement.

Combustible wooden decks and porches with open undersides are common.

FireSmart recommended guidelines for structural options include (Table 3):

Table 3: FireSmart Recommended Guidelines for Structural Options

Feature	FireSmart Recommended Guidelines
Roofing	 Use only ULC-rated Class A roofing materials
Siding	Use only ignition-resistant materials extending from ground-level to the roofline
Decks/Porches	 Use non-combustible or ignition-resistant materials Enclose undersides with fire-resistant sheathing Provide access to slotted-deck surface undersides to allow for regular debris removal

5.2 Infrastructure Options

Infrastructure options include provision of adequate access standards, adequate and accessible fire suppression water supply, utility installation standards, and adequate road and address signage.

5.2.1 Access

County main access road standards are generally adequate consisting of all-weather paved or gravel loop and dead-end designs with adequate traveled surface width and turn-around dimensions for fire apparatus. The following items not meeting FireSmart standards were observed:

- Mons View Resort, Birchland Resort, Hillside Acres, Whitefish Lake Resort, Paradise Cove Resort, and Bonnie Lake Resort are at the end of dead-end main access roads
- Turn-around dimensions for Birchland Resort spur roads are marginal for fire apparatus

Driveway access standards to some structures do not meet FireSmart standards for fire service apparatus with locked gates at the entrance, narrow/steep grades, and inadequate turn-around standards for fire-service apparatus.

5.2.2 Water Supply

None of the resort communities have pressurized hydrant fire-service water supply. Static natural water sources are readily available for most of the communities from local boat launches and Paradise Cove Resort has a non-potable water pumphouse from the lake to the site.

5.2.3 Franchised Utilities

Power is provided with above-ground distribution lines – most are within than one tree length of the forest cover. Smoky Lake County Fire Department reports that the power providers have strong maintenance programs and powerline fires are not common.

Gas distribution is provided by underground natural gas.



5.2.4 Road and Address Signage

Road and address signage meeting FireSmart recommended guidelines provides emergency responders with quicker response to values at risk during a wildfire. FireSmart recommended guidelines for road and address signage include:

- Signs should be clearly visible and legible from the road and use a consistent system of sequenced numbering
- Signs and posts should be built of non-combustible materials and mounted 2 metres above the surface of the road
- Letters, numbers, and symbols should be a minimum of 10 centimetres high, reflective, and contrast with the background color of the sign

Smoky Lake County rural addressing signage for roads and properties meets FireSmart standards.





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5.3 Development Legislation & Policy Options

Legislating *FireSmart* requirements for new development is an important step to creating FireSmart communities.

Smoky Lake County utilizes the Municipal Development Plan (MDP), Area Structure Plans (ASP), and the Land Use Bylaw (LUB) to control land use and development within the County. A review of each of these documents revealed that FireSmart development is dealt with at the Municipal Development Plan and Area Structure Plan levels with no specific FireSmart policies or regulations in the Land Use Bylaw.

Municipal Development Plan (MDP)

Objective 3.4.1 outlines FireSmart policies dealing with:

- Wildfire prevention techniques and development of on-site firefighting measures
- Review and comment of applications for subdivision and development by the Province and/or fire departments
- Consideration of conditions related to on-site water supply, fire-resistant building methods, spark arrestors on chimneys, and/or removal of vegetation
- Discouraging development in forested lands with significant wildfire hazard
- Requesting developers to provide appropriate fire protection measures
- Encouraging provision of emergency access to multi-parcel developments in forested areas

Area Structure Plans (ASP's)

The Garner Lake, Mons Lake, and Whitefish Lake Area Structure Plans (2009-2011) outline FireSmart requirements and recommendations dealing with:

- New developments and substantial additions or renovations to existing structures
- Recommended vegetation management standards related to grass, dead and dying trees, firewood, and distance between trees and buildings
- Structural requirements and recommendations related to roofing, siding, decks/porches, and chimneys
- Infrastructure requirements and recommendations related to access, water supply, and utilities

The only <u>requirement</u> in these ASP policies is the use of fire-rated roofing materials while the others are recommendations only. Field observations revealed that many of the "recommended" ASP policies related to structural materials and vegetation management standards are not being implemented.

Land Use Bylaw (LUB)

The LUB does not have any FireSmart-specific regulations resulting in the inability to regulate FireSmart development in any County areas outside of the Garner Lake, Mons Lake, and Whitefish Lake Area Structure Plans.

FireSmart requirements that could be included in the Municipal Development Plan and Land Use Bylaw as **requirements** for all new or retro-fit developments include:

- Developers to submit a comprehensive Wildfire Risk Assessment, prepared by a qualified professional, with subdivision and/or development permit application
- Use of fire-rated/fire-resistive exterior structure materials
- Design and construction of main road and driveway access to FireSmart standards
- Design and installation of adequate fire-service water supply
- Use of FireSmart species and materials for landscaping
- Implementation of FireSmart vegetation management based on wildfire behaviour potential

Recommendation 4: Complete a review and revise all applicable Smoky Lake County bylaws and planning documents to ensure alignment with FireSmart best-practices.

6 Public Education Options

Many of the structures within the planning area are at Moderate-High wildfire threat due to inadequate structural options and/or FireSmart vegetation management on private and/or municipal/provincial lands. Residents, business owners, developers, and Smoky Lake County administration and elected officials all need to be aware of the FireSmart hazard and the solutions to minimizing the risk and become a partner in implementation of FireSmart solutions in their own backyards and communities.

6.1 Key Messages

The following key messages are recommended to educate residents on their priorities to reduce the threat of wildfire to their structures.

- Use fire-rated/fire-resistive roofing, siding, and decking materials when building a new structure or when retro-fitting an existing structure
- Establish a minimum of 1.5 metres non-combustible clearance around the outer extent of all structures and outbuildings
- Maintain the grass around all structures and outbuildings for a minimum of 10 metres
- Remove conifer trees within 10 metres of structures and thin conifer trees for a minimum of 30 metres
- Provide regular maintenance of native grass, forest vegetation, and dead needles and leaves for a minimum of 30 metres around your house
- Skirt the undersides of your decks and porches to reduce the chances of fire getting underneath
- Store combustible material piles (firewood, hay bales, lumber piles, etc.) a minimum of 10 metres away from your structures
- Contact Smoky Lake County Fire Department to arrange for a FireSmart Hazard Assessment of your home and property

Recommendation 5: Develop and implement a focused, long-term, and repetitive FireSmart education program for all County residents and administration/elected officials.

6.2 FireSmart Hazard Assessments

Residents would benefit from a FireSmart Hazard Assessment of their home and property, conducted by a qualified individual, to identify those items that present wildfire threat and recommended methods to reduce that threat. FireSmart Canada offers the Advanced Fire Smart Home Assessment program that could be used to educate and encourage residents to take FireSmart actions in their own backyards.

Recommendation 6: Identify and train Smoky Lake County Fire Department members to provide Advanced FireSmart Hazard Assessments and options to reduce the wildfire threat to those residents that request one.

6.3 FireSmart Neighourhood Recognition Program

FireSmart Canada has initiated the FireSmart Neighbourhood Recognition Program to motivate and engage residents to plan and take FireSmart actions in their "own backyards" to reduce wildfire losses from the "grassroots" level. Because the majority of the planning area is private lands, this program is an excellent tool.

The program is driven through identification and training of key Municipal fire agency personnel to act as Local FireSmart Representatives to guide the process and community



members to act as Neighbourhood Champions to lead and implement the FireSmart Neighbourhood Recognition Program within their community.

Recommendation 7: Smoky Lake County Fire Department should identify and train key personnel to act as Local FireSmart Representations to implement the FireSmart Canada Neighbourhood Recognition Program in the Resort communities.

7 Inter-Agency Cooperation and Cross-Training Options

Interagency cooperation and cross-training between all stakeholders is necessary to ensure cooperative and effective implementation of FireSmart mitigation options and to coordinate an effective multi-agency response to a wildland/urban interface fire.

7.1 Inter-Agency Cooperation

Inter-agency stakeholders within or adjacent to the planning area include:

- Smoky Lake County
- Alberta Wildfire Management Lac La Biche Forest Area

Smoky Lake County has a mutual-aid wildfire agreement with the Alberta Wildfire Management for mutual-aid wildfire response and both have worked together on wildfires and structure protection incidents in the County.

7.2 Cross-Training

Smoky Lake County Fire Department currently provides Incident Command System training to all of their members and provided Wildland Firefighter (NFPA 1051) in 2017. There has not been any wildland/urban interface structure protection training provided.

Recommendation 8: Smoky Lake County Fire Department personnel should continue and enhance cross-training related to the to the following standards:

- Incident Command System (I-100 to I-400) as applicable
- Wildland Firefighter (NFPA 1051/1140 Level I or equivalent)
- Wildland/Urban Interface Structure & Site Preparation (WUI-M, S-115, S-215)
- FireSmart Canada Advanced FireSmart Home Assessment Workshop

8 Emergency Planning Options

Emergency preparedness is an important part of any disaster planning. The need for organization, clear chain of command, and an understanding of job responsibilities during a wildland/urban interface fire are of paramount importance.

8.1 Regional Emergency Management Plan

The Smoky Lake County Regional Emergency Management Plan (REMP) has been designed to ensure a quick and effective response to deal with natural, man-made and technological hazards affecting the Smoky Lake Regional Emergency Management Agency.

A review of the REMP reveals:

- The Incident Command System (ICS) is the accepted emergency management system for site and support/coordination functions which will provide a common incident management system for all response agencies when working together on a wildfire incident in the area
- The Smoky Lake County hazard and risk assessment has not yet been completed thus wildfire or wildland/urban interface fire is not currently identified in the REMP.

Recommendation 9: Once the Smoky Lake County hazard and risk assessment has been completed and wildfire has been identified, prepare a hazard-specific action plan for wildland/urban interface fires.

8.2 Wildfire Preparedness Guides

Wildfire Preparedness Guides (WPG) provide emergency responders with strategic and tactical information to protect values at risk from approaching wildfire. None of the Resort communities in this plan currently have a Wildfire Preparedness Guide.



Recommendation 10: Prepare Wildfire Preparedness Guides for each of the Resort communities.

8.3 Structure Protection Equipment

Structure Protection Units containing portable pumps, hose, sprinklers, and tools to protect structures from advancing wildfire have been shown to be very successful in reducing structure losses.

Smoky Lake County Fire Department would benefit from having a Structure Protection Unit, providing them with adequate structure protection equipment for an initial response on a wildland/urban interface fire.



Recommendation 11: Build a Smoky Lake County Fire Department Structure Protection Unit to provide adequate structure protection equipment for initial response to a wildland/urban interface fire.

8.4 Wildland/Urban Interface Exercises

Exercises to test emergency plans, personnel, and equipment for operational effectiveness are an excellent tool to ensure emergency management personnel and mutual-aid partners are familiar with the tools and tactics available.

Recommendation 12: Conduct regular wildland/urban interface table-top, functional, and/or field exercises between Smoky Lake County and applicable mutual-aid partners to test the Wildfire Preparedness Guide(s), Smoky Lake Regional Emergency Management Plan, and structure protection equipment.

Policy Statement and Guidelines:

1. STATEMENT

- 1.1 Custom works are not a core function of Smoky Lake County and will not take precedence over Public Works.
- 1.2 Smoky Lake County will be compensated for all performance of Custom Work in accordance with the Alberta Road Builders Annual Rate; unless otherwise determined by County Council; and is not to detriment of ongoing municipal operations.
- 1.3 Smoky Lake County will not provide custom work on Private Property. Ratepayers are encouraged to obtain the custom work services from private contractors or equipment to perform the required work. Exceptions may be authorized by Council when circumstance warrant where services or equipment may not be available to perform the requested work.
- 1.4 The County may enter into agreements if custom works warrants a long-term requirement with other municipalities and/or provincial / federal agencies for custom work and the rates to be charged will be in accordance with Alberta Road Builder Annual Rates.

2. OBJECTIVE

- 2.1 Establishing a Policy on Custom Works ensures that municipal equipment and resources are used in a fair and equitable manner. It also serves to enhance the overall accountability and transparency of the municipality.
- 2.2 As such, it is the intention of Smoky Lake County to support these agencies or organizations through the provisions of maintenance services upon operational requirements and availability of resources.
- 2.3 A proactive approach to assist these agencies or organizations and the Municipality is with minimizing risk and claims, controlling insurance costs and ensuring that coverage is available in the future.

4. GUIDELINES

- 4.1 The Public Works Manager reserves the right to refuse any requests for custom work if performance of the custom works will interfere with public work projects or lack of equipment or trained operators.
- 4.2 No custom work will commence unless the agencies or organizations have signed an Hold Harmless Agreement, as outlined in Schedule "A" Hold Harmless Agreement For Use in Connection with Custom Work, which is a requirement to that the County does not expose itself to any unnecessary risk.
- 4.3 The County shall be compensated for all performance of Custom Work in accordance with the Alberta Road Builders Annual Rate; unless otherwise determined by County Council.

5. PROCEDURES

- 5.1 Custom works shall be limited to the scope and abilities of the equipment and staff of the Public Works Department only.
- The date for performing the work to be at the discretion of the Public Works Manager with excerpts as detailed below:
 - municipal equipment is available.
 - municipal operations are not negatively impacted.
 - those requesting the custom work sign a Hold Harmless Agreement absolving this County for any liability risk.
 - may refuse to perform the work if they deem it unsafe or unnecessary.

Background:

Council approved this application on April 25, 2024, however; the application form is unclear where it asks for a legal land description. An aerial map was provided with the application, of where the waterline was to be installed however the map did not indicate legal descriptions.

The Public Works Road Foreman was following up with the landowners on June 6, 2024, who asked for a copy of the April 25, 2024 Council Motion #540-24, which was sent by email to them from the Executive Services Clerk. It was then realized, that the land location was incorrect in the Motion.

Smoky Lake County recognizes both the potential problems and benefits of private utility water line access to developed road allowances with the County. Smoky Lake County will consider applications for Water Line access to County Road right-of-ways. Applications will be considered if the applicant owns the land adjacent to both sides of the road allowance; and if not, both landowners must apply and sign the appropriate County Application jointly.

Benefits: To accommodate the Landowners

Disadvantages: Unknown.

Alternatives: Any alternative to the recommendation is at the discretion of Council.

Costs borne by Smoky Lake County to review applications and inspect construction and installation of Private Utility – Water Line shall be charged to the applicant, when applicable.



- developing additional criteria (optional) to recruit foreign nationals;
- this could include narrowing down the occupations that the community is interested in recruiting:
- responding to foreign national inquiries while community is actively recruiting;
- collaborating with employers on selecting and endorsing the foreign national; and
- developing and implementing a plan for welcoming and settling foreign national(s) to the community.

Residents within the Smoky Lake Region have expressed a need regarding the benefits of the RRS program that supports newcoming workers to rural areas. Therefore, the RRS possesses great potential to fill labour opportunities and boost the recent community development efforts in the Smoky Lake Region.

Dear Chief Elected Official

As you are aware, I recently introduced Bill 20: the Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act, 2024 which proposes to modify two key pieces of legislation for Alberta municipalities – the Municipal Government Act (MGA) and the Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA). The proposed legislation will help municipalities accelerate housing development, strengthen provincial oversight, and update the rules for local elections and locally elected officials.

Firstly, I want to recognize the passionate and constructive feedback I have received from the many mayors, reeves, councillors, and school board trustees across the province over the past few weeks. Your involvement and ardent commentary are a testament to your good work as public servants.

I've heard your concerns and at the May 23, 2024, Committee of the Whole, amendments to Bill 20 were tabled to further clarify the intent of this bill and ensure that locally elected municipal governments will continue to govern in response to the priorities and interests of their residents.

Bill 20 will maintain the municipal ability to govern affairs within local jurisdiction while allowing Cabinet to step in when municipal bylaw crosses into provincial jurisdiction. This will ensure that municipal councils remain focused on municipal issues that their constituents elected them to address. Cabinet's authority to intervene in municipal bylaws will be considered as a last resort; I anticipate that this power will be used very rarely, if ever. As you may know, the ability for the provincial government to repeal or amend bylaws, or dismiss councillors is not new, as municipalities receive their authority from the provincial government as laid out in Canada's Constitution and Alberta's MGA. While Bill 20 proposes to update the process for the provincial government to act more quickly in extenuating, urgent circumstances, these are not new powers.

These amendments will provide additional guardrails for when municipal bylaws can be repealed through the Cabinet process, and remove the direct ability for Cabinet to dismiss a councillor. Cabinet would retain the authority to have a vote of the electors on the potential removal of a councillor, putting this choice back into the hands of the voters.

We have also received a number of questions about some of the changes to the LAEA regarding fundraising. Bill 20 will also increase transparency in campaign financing. Under the old rules, the LAEA only regulated Third Party Advertisers (TPAs) who advertised for the promotion or opposition of a candidate during an election, with donations to such entities limited to a maximum of \$30,000 for all individuals, unions, and corporations. The proposed changes require TPAs who are interested in an issue (rather than a specific candidate) to register and report their finances. We are further proposing to restrict contributions to \$5,000, and for

contributions to only be made by Albertans, Alberta companies, or Alberta unions. We are also proposing to further develop expense limits in the regulations.

Currently, municipal candidates are able to organize into political parties or slates without any rules around their organization. Adding rules around political parties will increase transparency for electors. Bill 20 will provide rules around enabling local candidates to identify with local political parties without direct affiliation to provincial or federal parties. I have publicly stated my intention to implement the option to include municipal political party affiliation on ballots only in the cities of Edmonton and Calgary. I will also note that any that no candidate will be required to join a political party - they will always remain voluntary and local.

I will continue to consider feedback as I bring Bill 20 through the legislative process. Alberta's government remains committed to fairness and due process and will continue working with local authorities to ensure Albertans have the effective local representation they deserve. Should the legislation pass, Municipal Affairs will be engaging with municipalities and stakeholders over the coming months to explain the changes Bill 20 will require at a local level, and develop regulations as required.

Bill 20 – Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act, 2024 (AMENDED)

The proposed *Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act, 2024,* would make changes to two key pieces of municipal-related legislation: the *Local Authorities Elections Act (LAEA)* and the *Municipal Government Act (MGA)*.

- The *LAEA* establishes the framework for the conduct of elections in Alberta municipalities, school divisions, irrigation districts, and Metis Settlements.
- The **MGA** establishes the rules governing the conduct of local elected officials once on council, as well as the overall administration and operation of municipal authorities in Alberta.

On May 23, 2024, amendments were tabled to more clearly outline the authorities to dismiss a councillor and repeal a bylaw.

Changes to local election rules under the LAEA

Proposed changes to the LAEA aim to add greater transparency to and trust in local election processes.

Description of Proposed Changes	Current Status
Align candidate eligibility criteria with councillor disqualification criteria in the MGA.	Candidates elected to council may face immediate disqualification due to misalignment with the MGA's criteria.
Allow municipalities to require criminal record checks for candidates.	No provisions in place.
Allow union and corporate donations to local candidates, with the same donation limits as individual donors (\$5,000 per municipality per year).	Unions and corporations were prohibited from donating to municipal campaigns in the 2021 campaign.
Allow donations outside the local election year and require annual reporting of donations.	Donations outside of the campaign period (January 1 to December 31 in the year of a general election) were restricted to a maximum of \$5,000 per year.
Require third-party advertisers interested in plebiscites to register and report finances. Only Albertans, Alberta companies and Alberta unions can contribute to issues-based third-party advertisers, up to a maximum of \$5,000.	The <i>LAEA</i> only regulates third-party advertising for the promotion or opposition of a candidate during an election. There is no reference to issue-based advertising.
Limit donations to third party advertisers to \$5,000 per election period, which begins May 1 of the election year.	The current donation limit is \$30,000 for all individuals, unions, and corporations.
Enable regulation-making authority to define local political parties. This approach will be piloted in Calgary and Edmonton.	No provisions in place to regulate political parties at the local level.
Repeal the municipal authority to develop a voters list.	Municipalities can prepare a voters list, which must be shared with all candidates.
Require municipalities to use the most current provincial register of electors from Elections Alberta.	A permanent electors register is an internal document that assists with the conduct of an election. Municipalities can choose to develop one or not.
Expand the use of special ballots while strengthening special ballot processes.	Special ballots can only be requested for very specific reasons, including physical disability, absence from the municipality, or for municipal election workers.
Limit vouching to the ability to vouch for someone's address.	An elector can vouch for an individual's age, residence, and identity.
Repeal the ability for a candidate's official agent or scrutineer to object to an elector.	Candidate's official agents or scrutineers can object to an elector; however, the elector can still vote.
Enable regulation-making authority to postpone elections in emergencies.	No provisions in place to enable the Minister to postpone an election in the event of a natural disaster.



Prohibit automated voting equipment, such as electronic tabulators.	The <i>LAEA</i> permits municipalities, by bylaw, to process ballots by automated voting equipment.
Require recounts if requested by a candidate when the margin is within 0.5 percent of total votes.	Returning officers have discretion regarding recounts.
Clarifying rules and streamlining processes for scrutineers.	Concerns have been raised that the rules for scrutineers are not clear.

Strengthening the accountability of local councils under the MGA

Proposed changes to the *MGA* will help ensure local councils and elected officials are mindful of the common interests of Albertans and held to greater account by the citizens who elected them.

Accelerating housing development under the MGA

Affordable and attainable housing has become one of the most urgent concerns across the country, and Alberta's government is constantly searching for innovative ways to meet this challenge, including new tools for municipalities to leverage under the *MGA*.

Require municipalities to offer digital options for public hearings on planning and development and restrict them from holding extra hearings when not required by legislation.	No requirements in place for digital options. Municipalities can hold extra hearings beyond what's legislated.

Next steps

Should the legislation pass, supporting regulations would be developed through stakeholder engagement with municipalities and other partners, which is expected to take place in late spring and summer of 2024. If passed, it is anticipated that the majority of the legislation would come into force upon proclamation. Provisions that have property tax implications retain a January 1, 2025, coming into force date.

Good day to everyone;

At a recent pot luck supper at our Senior Citizens drop in center we had a guest speaker representing "Apidae" Home Care out of Bonnyville.

This was a very enlightening presentation, as it brought up several points which were either direct or subtle. It was noted that Direct Points were;

- 1) Elderly people that end up in Hospital for whatever medical reason normally stay in that facility for expended periods until a suitable room is made available in another facility.
- 2) It was mentioned there us up to a 9 month waiting list before Elderly citizens are relocated to a Lodge or Extended Care facility.
- 3) It was mentioned that the Federal as well as Provincial Gov't's are leaning towards having our Elderly stay at home and providing care for them at their place of residence.
- 4) I believe the amount mentioned was a \$1400.00/month allowance for each individual to offset the cost of Home care. Note! I cannot recall if that was per month or annually.....which would not include milage.
- 5) It was noted that the milage rate for Home care was at 0.70 cents per kilometer. Average distance from Bonnyville to Vilna and district is approximately 100km. x 2 ways = \$140.00 each visit.
- 6) It was not clear if the Eldery were responsible for "out of pocket" mileage.
- 7) It was assumed the \$1400/ month was for 1 visit per week.

Subtle Points arising;

- 1) Winter months can see roads plugged making regular Home Care visits hampered by drifted and snowed in accesses.
- a) Is there currently any partnering between Provincial or Municipal and Home Care Providers to ensure roads are cleared for scheduled visits?
- b) Is there currently any Provincial or Municipal initiatives in place to ensure roads are made passable immediately following a snow event to Senior Citizen residences in a rural setting (in this case) within the County of Smoky Lake boundaries in case there is a Medical emergency within that Seniors residence?
- 2) The comment about there being up to a 9 month wait a Senior Citizen to be relocated from a Hospital to a facility within the community is to say the least alarming.
- 3) Vilna has a facility (Vilna Hospital) that is still mechanically maintained and is currently used by Dr's from Smoky Lake to see patients within the Vilna community.
- a) Since the Dr's come to Vilna once a week anyways, is there any Federal, Provincial or Municipal drive to see this facility re- energized which can house 17 residents?
- b) Aside from the current Old Age facility in Vilna, re-establishing the Hospital to a Long Term Care facility would revitalize the town as well as provide a much needed service to Vilna and district residents as well as Indigenous residents from Goodfish, Whitefish and Saddle Lake communities. Is there or will there be any movement is this direction from any of the Governing Bodies?

In closing, it would be much appreciated if a return mail from each Governing Body clarifying their positions on Long Term Care within the County of Smoky Lake and if any and what initiatives are being looked at.

A response would be presented back to the people attending the next Senior Citizens supper....Better still, I believe that it would be much more appreciated if each Governing Body could coordinate within themselves to send 3 representatives to attend (free supper) and present their respective postions on the above mentioned matters of Senior Citizens and Long Term Care with this electoral boundary.



RMA Seeking Input on the Community Aggregate Payment Levy

The RMA seeking member input to assist in negotiations for the renewal of the CAP Levy regulations

The Community Aggregate Payment Levy (CAP Levy) Regulation was introduced in 2006 and enables municipalities to impose a CAP Levy on a shipment of sand and gravel, based on a uniform levy rate of up to a maximum of \$0.40 per tonne, at the pit from which the material was extracted. The current regulation expires on December 31, 2024.

The RMA is engaging with the Alberta Sand and Gravel Association to discuss possible changes to the CAP Levy Regulation. As part of this negotiation process, the RMA would like to hear from members about their experiences with the current CAP Levy Regulation and any possible regulatory changes that may be required. This input will help guide the RMA's approach to the negotiation process.
