BACKGROUND:

- On June 25, 2025, an application was received by administration to amend Land Use Bylaw No. 1272-14, to redistrict the subject lands from Agriculture (AG) District to Highway Commercial (C1) District.
- The subject lands are designated as Commercial Area under Section 7.2 Future Land Use, of Smoky Lake County Municipal Development Plan Bylaw No. 1249-12. The Municipal Development Plan serves to guide Council when

considering redistricting applications. The proposed redistricting is consistent with the future land use ascribed for the property in Municipal Development Plan, and therefore, the Municipal Development Plan does not require amendment.

- The portion of the subject lands that the applicant proposes to redistrict are approximately 1.23 hectares (3.04 acres) in area. The remainder of the subject lands is proposed to remain as Agriculture (AG) District under the Land Use Bylaw.
- The applicant proposes to establish a towing business (including an impound/storage yard), and RV storage, both of which are neither Permitted nor Discretionary Uses in the Agriculture District. By redistricting the subject lands to Highway Commercial, these uses would be permissible.
- Should Bylaw #1482-25 receive Third Reading, the owner of the lands will be required to obtain approval from the County's Development Authority for any proposed development. Any proposed development shall meet the regulations of the Highway Commercial (C1) District under Land Use Bylaw #1272-14, and any additional conditions prescribed by the County's Development Authority. Adoption of Bylaw #1482-25 does not constitute Development Authority approval.

Background:

On September 10, 2025, administration received a request from the Smoky Lake Snowmobile Trail Twisters (1998) Society to lease the lands legally described as PT. NE-30-59-14-W4M, for the purposes of constructing a warm-up cabin, outhouse and woodshed, adjacent to Range Road 145. The Society requests the utilization of approximately +/- 1.0 acre of land to facilitate these improvements. The propose improvements are to be constructed on skids for ease of removal should the County require. Typically, Policy No. 13-01 allows for the least of municipally-owned lands for agricultural purposes. The County does not have a separate Policy for requests to lease land for other purposes. Administration is recommending that the aforementioned lands be advertised as part of a Limited Invitation to Tender pursuant to Smoky Lake County Policy No. 13-01: Surface Lease of Municipally-Owned Properties.

Benefits: Additional revenue for the County through lease payments/property taxes; less maintenance costs for maintaining County-owned lands; additional recreational opportunities for residents and visitors.

Disadvantages: According to Policy No. 13-01, a Right of First Refusal will be written into a surface lease agreement which would allow the leaseholder the first opportunity to purchase the lands that they hold a lease for in the event that a third-party offer is made to purchase said lands. This clause may prevent the sale of municipally-owned lands for development purposes.

Alternatives: Do not advertise a Limited Invitation to Tender to lease municipally-owned lands.

Legislation Reference: Alberta Provincial Statutes

Purpose: This Policy is to guide Smoky Lake County in the management of municipally-owned properties that are leased for agricultural purposes.

Policy Statement and Guidelines:

STATEMENT:

- 1.1 Smoky Lake County desires to establish standards, conditions and procedures for the leasing of municipally-owned properties for agricultural purposes.
- 1.2 Smoky Lake County supports agricultural utilization of municipally-owned properties and may lease these properties to individuals and/or businesses, in accordance with the guidelines and procedures outlined in this Policy, to safeguard the County's assets and interests.

2. OBJECTIVES:

- 2.1 Smoky Lake County shall provide municipally-owned properties for lease to serve the interests and needs of the agricultural sector, when it is deemed that these properties are suitable for such purposes and where the County does not plan to develop or use these properties in the short or long term.
- 2.2 The municipally-owned properties must be managed efficiently and maintained or improved through proper agricultural practices to ensure their long-term viability and to ensure adequate stewardship of the properties.

3. GUIDELINES:

3.1 Lease of Municipally-Owned Properties

- 3.1.1 The County provides the opportunity for County residents and businesses to lease municipally-owned properties for agricultural purposes. The process will include the preparation of a Resolution for Council to authorize a municipally-owned property to be leased through a limited invitation to tender process. Only those individuals and businesses that pay property taxes to the County are eligible to lease municipally-owned properties.
- 3.1.2 Properties available to be leased shall be advertised through a limited invitation to t ender process, as specified in Schedule "A": Limited Invitation to Tender: Surface Lease of Municipally-Owned Properties. Bids are to be submitted as detailed in the limited invitation to tender. It is noted that no late submissions shall be accepted.
- 3.1.3 Council reserves the right to refuse, at its sole discretion, any bid, regardless of whether the applicant is the highest bidder.

3.1.4 If a bid is deemed to be incomplete, at the sole discretion of the County, it may be rejected.

3.2 Lease Terms

- 3.2.1 The term of a lease for municipally-owned properties shall not exceed (5) five-years.
- 3.2.2 The County, at its sole discretion, and after providing 60-days notice, may cancel a lease at any time, for any of the following reasons:
 - the lessee requests the cancellation of the lease;
 - the leased property is not being used for the purpose for which it was leased;
 - the lease was issued in error;
 - the lessee fails to pay the required lease fees by the due date;
 - the lessee has failed to comply with the terms and conditions of the lease agreement, and
 - the County, at its sole discretion, determines that the leased property is required for municipal purposes or wishes to dispose of the land via sale.
- 3.2.3 Lease payments are to be made annually as per the successful bid, and shall include the payment of all applicable taxes on the property.
- 3.2.4 Leaseholders have thirty (30) days to pay the invoiced amount in full to the County.
- 3.2.5 If payment is not received by the County within 30 days of the invoice date, the leaseholder is in default of their lease agreement and will be notified accordingly. If the outstanding fees are not paid in full within sixty (60) days of the invoiced date, the lease agreement may be unilaterally terminated by the County.
- 3.2.6 A minimum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000.000.00) personal Liability Insurance, with Smoky Lake County as named insured, must be maintained for the duration of the lease and shall provide proof of such insurance to the satisfaction of the County upon demand.
- 3.2.7 Leaseholders shall, at all times, indemnify and save harmless the County from any and all losses, costs, damages, actions, causes of action, suits, claims and demands whatsoever that may be lawfully brought or made against the County by reason of anything done by the leaseholder, your invitees, or agents, whether or not such things are done in the exercise or purposed exercise of the rights herein conferred upon you. The County shall not be liable nor responsible for any bodily or personal injury or property damage of any nature what-so-ever that may be suffered or sustained by the leaseholder, their invitees, or agents in the performance of the lease agreement.

- 3.2.8 No development, construction of any buildings or improvements, nor free/brush removal shall be permitted on the leased property unless approval is granted by the County. Any improvements (e.g., fencing, animal shelter, etc.) made to any leased municipally-owned property, shall be at the sole expense of the leaseholder, and any chattels remaining on the leased property shall become the property of the County if they are not removed prior to the effective date of termination of the lease agreement.
- 3.2.9 Subletting or subleasing of leases of municipally-owned properties is not permitted and is grounds for immediate and unitateral cancellation of the lease agreement by the County.
- 3.2.10 All bids to lease municipally-owned property shall be approved by resolution of Council and shall be subject to the signing of a Surface Land Lease Agreement with the County.
- 3.2.11 The leaseholder shall allow the County the right to enter the municipally-owned property as the County deems necessary or appropriate, from time to time, to cause or allow third-parties to construct or install permanent underground or above ground utility lines, pipeline facilities and transmission lines which cross the leased property, or to perform such other work upon the leased property as may be deemed necessary at the sole discretion of the County, and the leaseholder shall in no way interfere with or hinder the construction, installation, repair or maintenance work undertaken by the County or by any person to whom the County has granted such permission. The leaseholder shall forthwith, upon having received reasonable notice of the request from the County, execute such further documentation as deemed appropriate, in the sole discretion of the County, for the purposes of expediting any such work by the County or other person granted permission by the County. The leaseholder shall have the right to post signage on the property to prohibit trespassing from May 1st to October 31st. Any member of the public who wishes to access leased municipally-owned property shall make a request to the lessee to obtain access.
- 3.2.12 Leaseholders shall be responsible to maintain the quality and integrity of the municipallyowned property through adherence to land management practices consistent with agricultural practices commonly used in the area where the property is located.

3.3 Lease Agreements

- 3.3.1 Leaseholders shall comply with the terms and conditions of their lease agreement, in accordance with Schedule "B": Surface Land Lease Agreement, at all times.
- 3.3.2 Leaseholders must conform to all Federal, Provincial and Municipal legislation, regulations and policies relating to land management.

- 3.3.3 Leaseholders are responsible for weed control on municipally-owned land. If a noxious weed as designated under the Weed Control Act is found on lands that are subject to a lease agreement, the County's Agricultural Service Department will notify the leaseholder in accordance with Policy Statement No. 62-14: Weed Inspection and Weed Notice.
- 3.3.4 The County will communicate warnings in writing via Registered Mail, in the event of a breach of a lease agreement. If the breach identified in the notice is not rectified in a time and manner suitable to the County, and as indicated in the notice, the County reserves the right to unitaterally terminate the lease agreement.
- 3.3.5 Smoky Lake County reserves the right to terminate lease agreements due to breaches of the lease agreement and/or this Policy. If a leaseholder is found in breach of this Policy or of his or her lease agreement, the County reserves the right to not accept future bids from said leaseholder. In such circumstances, the County agrees to notify the affected leaseholder at least sixty (60) days prior to the termination of the lease agreement.
- 3.3.6 When a lease is due to expire in the following year, the leaseholder will be contacted by the County in writing, informing the leaseholder of the expiration date and to indicate the intent that the leased property will be subject to a limited invitation to tender process when advertised by the County.

4. PROCEDURES:

- 4.1 Individuals and businesses who are interested in leasing municipally-owned properties are directed to inquire with the Planning and Development Department. - 4.4 Once a bid is approved by Council, a lease agreement shall be signed and executed by the County and the successful bidder. The lease agreement shall be issued for a (5) five-year term and shall be billed annually until the expiration of the term. Either party may cancel the lease agreement at any time, provided that the party instigating the cancellation provides the other party with a minimum of sixty (60) days' notice.
- 4.5 Once the lease agreement has been executed, the Pfanning and Development Department will send a copy to the Finance Department who will be responsible for creating an accounts receivable based on the amount defined in the lease agreement and to ensure receipt of the yearly lease fees throughout the term of the lease.

The leaseholder must exercise their Right of First Refusal to Purchase by notifying the County within thirty (30) days of having received notice, and must match the price offered by the third-party offer. Should the leaseholder choose not to exercise their Right of First Refusal to Purchase, they shall notify the County in writing, within thirty (30) days of having received notice, that they waive this Right.
 - 4.6.2 If the leaseholder declines to purchase or waives their Right of First Refusal to Purchase pursuant to Section 4.6.1, the County shall be at liberty to proceed with acceptance of the third-party offer to purchase said municipally-owned property and subsequently terminate the lease agreement, pursuant to Section 3.6.
 - 4.6.3 If the leaseholder exercises their Right of First Refusal to Purchase, the leaseholder shall be obligated to purchase the property and shall provide a cash deposit, in the amount of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), at the time that they provide notice of exercising of their Right. The Leaseholder shall be required to execute an "Agreement to Purchase" with the County and to adhere to its terms and conditions, in accordance with Policy Statement No. 61-10: Disposition of County Owned Property.

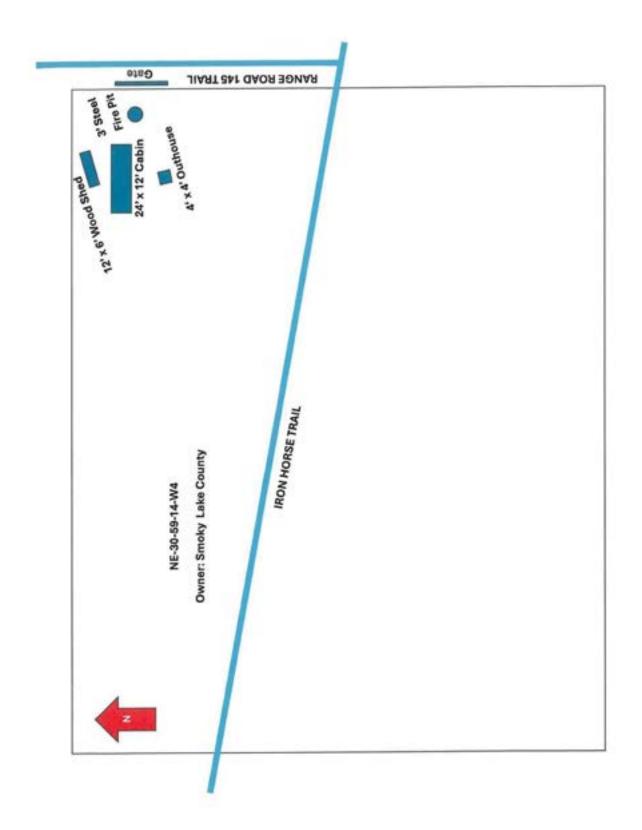

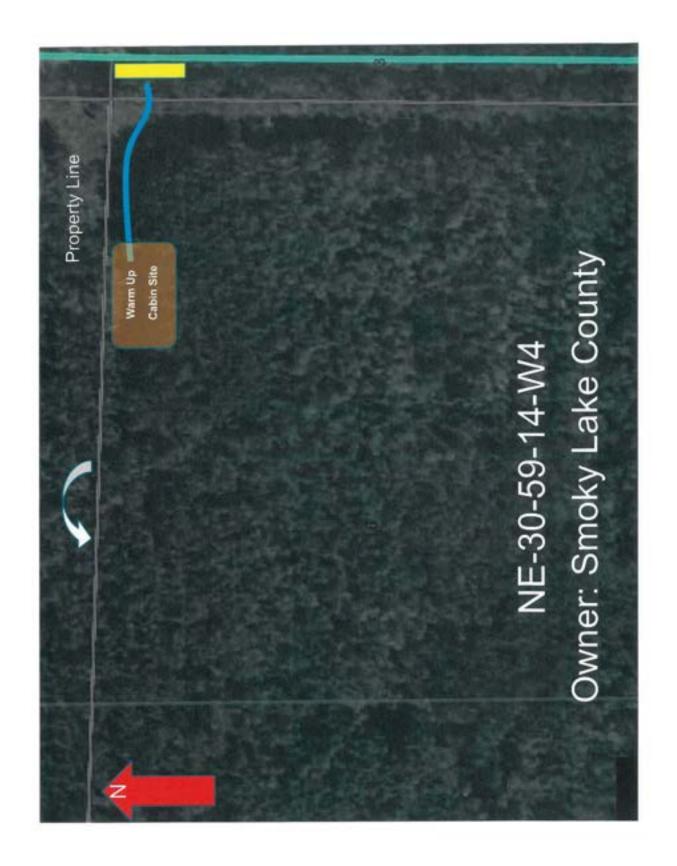

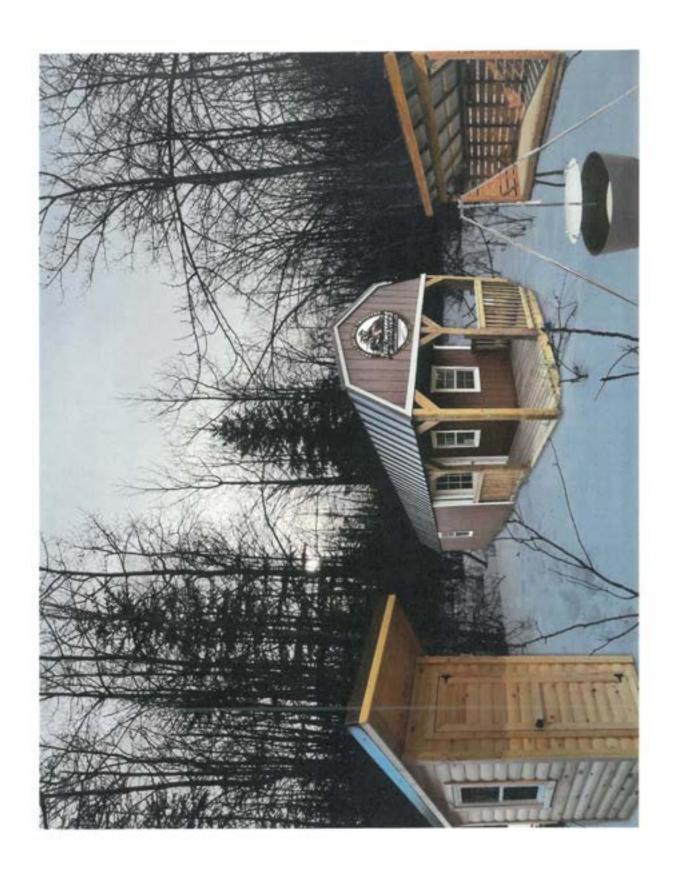

- 2. That Smoky Lake County Council serve a Notice of Intention to Designate the St. Elias (Pakan) Church, located on the lands legally described as Plan 5011CE, Block A, as a Municipal Historic Resource, to the owners of said lands, pursuant to Section 26 of the Historical Resources Act, and to instruct administration to prepare a Designation Bylaw for Council's consideration following the expiry of the 60-day notification period.

Background:

On September 11, 2025, administration received a request from the Chairwoman of the Smoky Lake County Regional Heritage Board, recommending that Council designate both the Wynnyk House and the St. Elias (Pakan) Church, as Municipal Historic Resources, pursuant to the Historical Resources Act. Prior to Council being able to consider a Designation Bylaw for either of the resources, a Notice of Intention to Designate must be served on the owners of the resources a minimum of sixty (60) days before consideration of a Bylaw.

Benefits: Protection, preservation and promotion of local history which can be leveraged as an economic development opportunity to promote heritage-based tourism.

Disadvantages: Designation of Municipal Historic Resources can restrict certain activities/improvements

of these Resources.

RE: Municipal Historic Designation Recommendations

The Smoky Lake Regional Heritage Board is mandated to identify and promote local heritage resources and to facilitate the historic designation process. This year, we recommend two buildings be given municipal historic designation.

- > St Elias (Pakan) Church, built in 1954, and the associated bell tower, built in 1906. Municipal heritage value lies in its representation of religious ethnic identity in the Pakan district and its link with the immigration period around 1900. It is also a well-preserved structure relative to many other culturally and historically significant structures that remain on the landscape but are rapidly disappearing.
- The <u>Wynnyk house</u> was built in 1936 serving not only as a farmhouse but also as a store and the Stry post office. The house has municipal heritage value for its design and because of the contributions of the post office and store to developing commerce in the rural area. It also served as a social hub for people in the community.

The Heritage Board has met with the property owners and representatives on site to gather information and to view and photograph the buildings. Statements of Significance have been written for each and are provided to the county.

We look forward to hearing from you and working further on promoting these historic resources as part of the Smoky Lake County's heritage.

Wynnyk House

13266 Township Road 584 sw 27-58-13 W4

Description of Heritage Place

The Wynnyk house, built in 1936, originally included a store and the Stry Post Office. It is a two storey, stucco-clad building with a medium-gable roof, banks of three windows in dormers on both sides of the roof and a curved areade framing a front verandah. There is a bay-shaped extension with four single-hung windows on the west-side. Storm windows are on the veranda and the extension. The back entry includes an enclosed vestibule. The house is located within a private farmyard facing south and is set back from the rural gravel road.

Heritage Value

The heritage value of the Wynnyk house lies in its association with the provincial historic themes of Agricultural Development and Commerce and its association with the Canadian Postal Service. The house has municipal heritage value for its design and because of the contributions of the post office and store to developing the rural community. It also has value as a local landmark as it was once a gathering place for people in the community.

Peter Wynnyk was born in Sokal, Ukraine. In 1910, he claimed this land and constructed a tworoom, sod-roofed log house. When Peter was appointed postmaster in 1920, the house also accommodated a post office. The house standing today was built in 1936 and reflects the increased economic stature of the Wynnyks as the farm became established. The post office and small store were located at the front of the house.

The Stry Post Office did not have regular hours of operation but opened at the convenience of its pioneer patrons. Peter Wynnyk retired in 1960 and his son, Metro, succeeded him as postmaster. One of Metro's sons, Bill, recollects that the kids were not allowed in the post office and the mail was treated with respect as it was Royal Mail that was delivered in a canvas bag secured with a large lock opened with a six-inch key. For as long as Bill can remember, the mail was delivered to them twice a week by Floyd Cozicar in his purple Fargo half ton. Once the mail was delivered, postmaster Wynnyk sorted it and handed it out to community members as they arrived throughout the day. Here, neighbours also met up and socialized and made small purchases in the store. The Stry Post Office and Wynnyk General Store closed in 1968, as improved roads made travel to Vilna for mail and supplies more convenient.

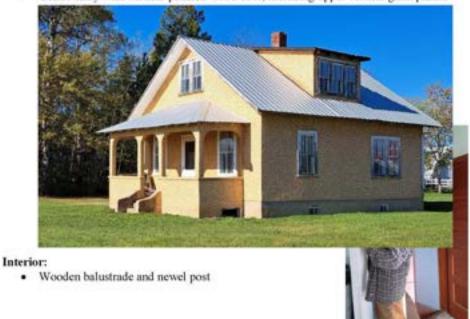
The resource is significant for its Craftsman style influences evident in the roof dormers, the bay style extension, the hip roof and curved openings on the verandah. The structure is a good example of a farmhouse that contained, and adapted to, a mix of functions to serve the local rural community.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Saint Elias Russo Greek Orthodox Church (Pakan Church) and Bell Tower

NW 28-58-17 W4

Description of Heritage Place

Saint Elias Orthodox Church, built in 1954, is a place of worship for descendants of immigrants from the Bukovyna / Galicia Region of what is now Ukraine. It is a wood framed structure clad with stucco. Constructed on a cruciform plan in the Byzantine style, it widens at the sanctuary end and has a central dome at the intersection. Wrought iron crosses top the onion shaped domes on octagonal drums on the multi-faceted gable and hip roof. The church is part of a religious complex that also includes the bell tower, community hall, cemetery and serenity garden. The church (1954) and bell tower (1906) are historically significant.

Heritage Value

St. Elias Russo Greek Orthodox Church is significant because of its association with the provincial heritage theme of spiritual life. Municipal heritage value lies in its representation of religious ethnic identity in the Pakan district and its link with the immigration period of the late 1800s. It is also a well-preserved structure relative to many other culturally and historically significant structures that remain on the landscape but are rapidly disintegrating.

In 1899, a few Ukrainian and Romanian families in the area needed a place for worship and a cemetery. That year, the homesteaders chose a location one and a half miles east of the present site and, in 1900, began cutting and hauling logs. A couple of years later, construction began but a survey revealed that the site was in the middle of a quarter section and would consequently be quite a distance from the public road. The site where the existing church sits was then chosen and three acres were purchased from the Hudson Bay Co. Block 1. Carpenters were hired to build the church and a blacksmith to shape the iron crosses that topped the onion-shaped domes. The largest cross was chisel-stamped 1904. The interior of the church was slowly completed over the next two years; subsequently, the bell tower was built in 1906.

Unfortunately, on January 7th 1954, during the Christmas day service, the church caught fire. The next day, fundraising began and soon carpenter John Mnohalitny of Andrew was hired to build a new church. Construction of the church you see now was completed that same year. The iconostas was carved by Peter Chetek. Bells were installed in the new belfry and the old bell house was donated to the Shandro museum. In 1961, the parish hall was built with a kitchen and dining/meeting room. A serenity garden has recently been developed on the grounds; among many elements in the garden is a huge concrete fragment of the 1906 church foundation.

In 2022, the 1906 bell tower was moved from Shandro back to Pakan and placed on top of a concrete pad to preserve the foundational logs. The roof was reshingled and the structure was braced, clad with new wood and given a new set of stairs that lead up to the bells.

This Russo Greek Orthodox Church is significant for its style and method of construction as it follows the building traditions of the prairie Byzantine church and embodies a high quality of workmanship. The prominent dome over the cruciform transept with smaller domes and

wrought iron crosses stand as a landmark and symbol of orthodoxy in the Pakan District.

Character-defining Elements - CHURCH

Exterior Elements:

- Cruciform footprint and orientation of the church on its site narthex (entryway) to the west, apse (curved end with sanctuary) at the east end
- Large central, onion-shaped, octagonal-dome over the nave
- · Smaller domes over narthex and apse
- Orthodox metal cross finials on each dome
- Arched cross-style stained glass windows
- · Wheel windows over narthex and transept



Interior Elements:

- Spatial configuration, including the nurthex and nave separated from the sanctuary by an iconostas
- Large domed ceiling above the transect of the cruciform floor plan
- Carved iconostas with royal doors in the centre and two side entrance doors from nave to sanctuary
- · Traditional painted icons
- Curved supports on pilasters surrounding nave
- · Balcony / Choir loft with stair access



Character-defining Elements - BELL TOWER

Exterior Elements:

- · Cedar shingles
- Vertical wood plank cladding
- · Exposed rafters on upper section, wooden soffit on lower section





Interior Elements:

- Wood slat ceiling and walls on main floor
- · Non-aesthetic, yet skilled construction in the belfry including mortise and tenon corner beams and wooden pegs
- Original bells dated 1904

Topic: Hauling and Disposal of Solid Waste Contract **Presented By:** Environmental Operations Manager

Recommendation

That Smoky Lake County Council award the Hauling and Disposal of Solid Waste Contract to Proposal 1, 2, 3, or 4 for a three (3) year term, commencing October 1, 2025 and ending October 31, 2028, based on the contractor's submission demonstrating the best overall value to the County in terms of cost-effectiveness, service reliability, and capacity to meet operational requirements.

Background:

Smoky Lake County has maintained the delivery of solid waste collection and disposal services through a combination of internal operations and contracted hauling support. These services are essential to maintaining environmental standards, community cleanliness, and public health across the County's rural and hamlet areas. In recent years, the County has experienced rising operational costs driven by factors including:

- Increases in equipment purchase and maintenance costs
- Higher fuel prices and transportation-related expenses
- Labor shortages and the increasing cost of attracting and retaining skilled manpower
- Changes in provincial and regulatory requirements related to waste handling and landfill operations

Recognizing the financial and logistical pressures on this critical municipal function, Smoky Lake County Council directed Administration to conduct a comprehensive review of its solid waste services. The purpose of this review was to explore alternative service delivery models and cost-saving opportunities that would continue to meet resident expectations while ensuring long-term sustainability.

Administration was tasked with evaluating both in-house and contracted options, assessing service quality, operational efficiency, and total cost implications. The findings and recommendations from this review have been brought forward for Council's consideration to guide the County's strategic direction in managing solid waste services moving forward.

On September 9, 2025, Regular Council meeting, council requested that the Contractors provide an annual cost of the Waste Hauling and Disposal as well at monthly bin rentals.

That Smoky Lake County Council direct administration to reissue the tender with a more focused scope, using the same criteria for each individual tender, for the September 25, 2025 Regular Council Meeting



Benefits:

Transitioning from an in-house to a contracted solid waste removal model can offer several advantages for Smoky Lake County, particularly in response to rising costs, workforce challenges, and long-term sustainability goals. Below are the key benefits of moving to a contracted model:

1. Cost Predictability and Budget Control

- Contracted services typically operate on a fixed-term agreement, which can provide stable and Predictable budgeting over the life of the contract
- Reduces exposure to fluctuating fuel, maintenance, and staffing costs that the County currently absorbs, through its in-house model.

2. Reduced Capital Investment

- Smoky Lake County will not be required to purchase or replace expensive waste collection trucks, bins, or related equipment.
- This allows the County to allocate capital resources toward other essential infrastructure or community priorities.

3. Lower Maintenance and Liability Risk

4. Improved Workforce Flexibility

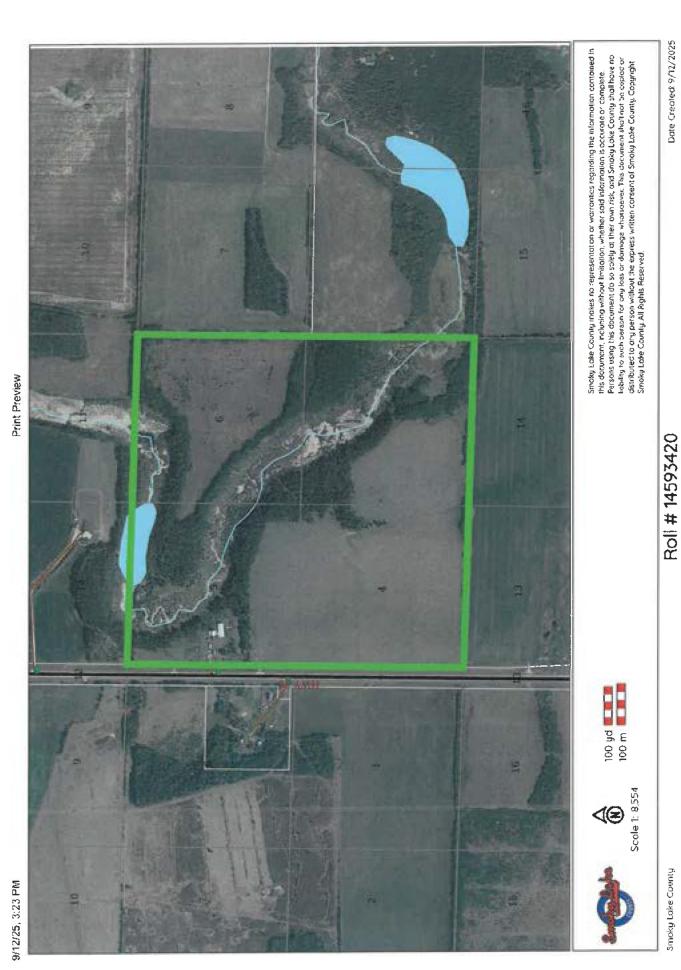

Recommendation:

That Smoky Lake County Council take no action in regard to the letter from Eddy Huk, President, Ukrainian Orthodox Society of Spedden, dated August 19, 2025.

Background:

At September 11, Regular Council Meeting, Council requested a Summary of Halls and Churches natural Gas Consumption and Costs from August 2024 to August 2025.

Smoky Lake County received a letter asking that all halls and churches serviced by Smoky Lake County Natural Gas receive natural gas "at cost" by removing the \$1.94 per gigajoule operations and maintenance (O&M) fee.

Council previously approved a similar request at the April 10, 2025 meeting (Motion #417-25), waiving the \$26 monthly service charge for 10 hall and church accounts. However, any further special rate changes must first be approved by Rural Utilities.

A provincial poll of 12 Co-ops and Utilities found that only one approved a single exemption for a monthly service charge. Smoky Lake County is currently the only Utility that has approved multiple exemptions for halls and churches. Approving more rebates could therefore set a precedent, encouraging similar requests across the province.

Benefits:

The additional funds available to the non-profit help keep the hall and church active.

Disadvantages:

Lost revenue to the Natural Gas Department that would have to be recovered through user fees charged to all customers.

Alternatives:

A discounted natural gas rate per gigajoule for Smoky Lake County Natural Gas halls and churches, pending governmental approval.

Financial Implications:

Financial implications to Smoky Lake County Natural Gas would depend on actual consumption. If the natural gas was sold to these accounts "at cost", we would receive \$1.94 per gigajoule lower than the rate at which our natural gas is sold to all residential customers. The chart below shows an example of how our revenue would have been decreased if the \$1.94 had been removed for the past 12 months.

Topic: Recreational Vehicles Bylaws

Presented By: Jordan Ruegg, Planning and Development Manager

Background:

Smoky Lake County Council tasked administration with conducting a jurisdictional scan of other municipalities to determine how many recreational vehicles (RVs) are permitted on agricultural properties and whether those RVs are subject to any regulations. Currently, Smoky Lake County Bylaw No. 1432-23 (RV Bylaw) does not restrict the number of RVs permissible within agricultural areas. Bylaw 1432-23 also prohibits RVs from being permanently connected to any utility or municipal service in all areas within the County. The lack of clarity surrounding the number of RVs permissible within agricultural areas has triggered this review.

Jurisdictional Scan

County of Wetaskiwin

- Permanent

- RVs allowed on parcels of land less than forty (40) acres in size = three (3).
- RVs allowed on parcels of land that are greater than forty (40) acres in size = four
 (4).
- Temporary (for family functions/weddings/etc.)
 - RVs allowed on parcels of land that are less than one (1) acre in area and have a
 dwelling present = five (5).
 - RVs allowed on parcels of land that are between one (1) acre and two (2) acres in area and have a dwelling present = ten (10).
 - RVs allowed on parcels of land between two (2) acres and less than twenty (20) acres in area = twenty (20).
 - RVs allowed on parcels of land that are greater than twenty (20) acres in area = thirty (30).
 - All temporary RVs are subject to Recreational Units During Family Functions Policy
 - Maximum duration = 96 hours/ 4 days.
 - May only be allowed to have temporary RVs twice a year/property (additional requests can be allowed at the discretion of the CAO).
 - The use or function must abide by all Municipal, Provincial, and Federal legislation, including, but not limited to the County's Noise Bylaw and regulatory requirements for the disposal of wastewater.

- The placement of the Recreational Vehicle(s) shall not, in the opinion of the Development Authority, result in any one or more of:

 - 2) Adverse impacts on the use, enjoyment or value of neighbouring parcels, or;

- 3.2 To support Council in balancing the right to request/receive information while upholding the duty to inform all members of Council of Requests for Information.

4. GUIDELINES:

Department: Office of the CAO **Reporting Period:** August 2025.

1. Key Accomplishments

In August, Executive Services worked on HR Policies and updated Job Descriptions for Council. Reviewed Bylaws to ensure compliance with legislation and alignment with the MGA. Attended the Smoky Lake Parade. Taught the WHMIS Course to 12 employees. Prepared for the HRVA Session and Emergency Management Meeting. Participated in the Highway 28/63 Commission Meeting. Prepared Council agendas and attended the Regular Council Meeting on August 28, the Committee of the Whole on August 20, and the Special Council Meeting on August 27. Prepared for upcoming elections by meeting with the Returning Officer, Legislative Services, and Communications. Held a meeting with Public Works, GIS, Planning, and Development regarding fleet maintenance software requirements.

Legislative Services was actively involved in attending and preparing agendas and minutes for a variety of meetings, including Regular and Special Council meetings, the Joint Health and Safety meeting, Committee of the Whole meetings, and an Intermunicipal Development Plan meeting with the Village of Waskatenau. In addition to this, Legislative Services played a key role in drafting the Ukrainian Twinning Bylaw and worked closely with the Executive Assistant to format several HR policies. Both Legislative Services and the Executive Assistant teamed up to assist with the filming of the Smoky Lake County Segment, which involved organizing a range of activities throughout the county. Legislative Services also handled weekly office orders, ensuring the smooth running of day-to-day operations.

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

Time management was a key challenge in August due to overlapping meetings, election preparation, and urgent Council scheduling. To manage workload efficiently, collaboration between Executive and Legislative Services was strengthened to divide responsibilities for Council packages and external meetings.

Department: Health & Safety

Reporting Period: August 2025

1. Key Accomplishments

- Qualification Audit: Completed the audit, which included documentation review, interviews, and observations. The report was submitted to AMHSA by the August 19 deadline. Feedback was received from AMHSA, and an extension until September 23 was granted for improvement and recommended participation in an upcoming webinar on audit report writing.
- Training & Education: Thirteen employees from various departments successfully completed in-house WHMIS training instructed by the Coordinator and the Executive Services Clerk.
- Joint Health and Safety Committee: The monthly meeting was held with all agenda documentation prepared and circulated in advance. Two new members joined the Joint Health and Safety Committee, with training assigned in accordance with OHS legislation.
- Emergency Management: Maintained Alberta Emergency Alert status by completing the required monthly practice alert. Preparations were finalized for the September Emergency Management Agency Meeting, including outreach to external agencies, venue booking, and issuing a catering tender.
- Professional Development: Attended a Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment course in Fort McMurray, delivered by AEMA, which outlined the new formal process for conducting community HIRAs. This process will be applied during the September meeting.
- Operational Compliance: Obtained drivers' abstracts for all County employees.
- Incident Management: Conducted 12 incident investigations (10 incidents, 2 near misses), identifying root causes and implementing corrective actions.

 Policy Development: Continued work on updating and developing health and safety policies and procedures to strengthen the County's health and safety management system.

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

The most significant challenge this month was balancing the completion of the qualification audit with ongoing departmental responsibilities. As a single-person department, this required reframing my mindset from regular duties to objectively reviewing the health and safety management system from a compliance perspective. By working remotely for several days, I was able to dedicate the necessary focus to the audit while still ensuring that essential tasks were maintained.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

Notable progress was made toward advancing the County's strategic goals in Emergency Services. By engaging with key external agencies and arranging their attendance at the upcoming Emergency Management Agency Meeting, steps were taken to ensure stronger coordination and alignment among service providers. This collaboration will enhance the County's ability to respond effectively to emergencies and aligns directly with the strategic priority of ensuring community safety and preparedness.

4. Staffing & Resources

- No staffing changes occurred in August.
- The Coordinator was on vacation for five days; incident investigation duties were delegated to department managers and the Executive Assistant, all of whom have completed AMHSA incident investigation training. This ensured continuity of investigations.

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Executive Services Collaborated on preparations for the September Emergency
 Management Agency Meeting, including logistics, documentation, and external agency coordination.
- Joint Health and Safety Committee Continued engagement with representatives from across County departments to share concerns, review incidents, and identify corrective actions.
- Environmental Operations Participated in the qualification audit process, which highlighted how health and safety programs apply directly to their operations.

6. Next Steps & Outlook

Priorities for September include:

• Completing and resubmitting the improved audit report to AMHSA by September 23.

Hosting the Emergency Management Agency Meeting and leading the Hazard

Summary of Incidents for August 2025

Date: August 7, 2025

Type: Theft Incident

<u>Description:</u> While walking out of work at the end of the day to their vehicle, 2 employees noticed that one of their trucks' gas caps was on the ground next to a puddle of something near

the gas tank. They noticed that the inside of the vehicle had been gone through as well, the

center console was open, and a spare change container was gone.

Cause: Crime

Action: The incident was reported to the RCMP on August 12, 2025, and any relevant security

camera footage was provided. The RCMP officer also spoke to the affected employee for their

statement and to an employee who saw the driver.

Date: August 9, 2025

Type: Security Related Incident

<u>Description:</u> An employee came to the main office on Saturday to do some work and accidentally set off the alarm. They punched in their code, and it went away. They then finished up their work and left.

Come Monday morning, an employee was reviewing the security camera footage as they had received the notifications over the weekend of the alarm, and saw that after the employee left on Saturday, an RCMP officer conducted a walk-around of the building and somehow got into the building near the boiler room. The employee contacted the RCMP and asked if the officer could inform them of how they entered the building (did he have a key, was a door left open, etc.). It was determined that the door to the boiler room with access to the outside wasn't fully latched.

<u>Cause:</u> Boiler room outside access door not latched, and is difficult to fully close.

<u>Action:</u> The door has since been closed fully, and employees are going to attempt to adjust the door so it will close properly. The employee who discovered this has also contacted the alarm company and requested a technician come out to add an alarm sensor to the door so that we can be notified if it is not closed, and to ensure that the alarm system can't be armed without that door being closed.

Date: August 9 and 10, 2025

Type: Break and Enter Incident

<u>Description:</u> A worker arrived at Bodgan's Pit in the morning around 8:15 AM and saw that the front gate was open and there were items scattered around the approach. Shortly after seeing this, the worker called their manager to report it to the RCMP. The lock was still intact, but they cut off the piece of metal on the front gate, cut the lock off the second gate and left it open. The RCMP came on site and reviewed the photos taken by the cameras and found an image of the truck that broke in. There was also a shoe print on the orderant shack and in the gravel near the building. Nothing of note was stolen.

Cause: Crime

<u>Action:</u> The department manager contacted the RCMP, the workers involved replaced the broken lock, and another worker created a new metal bracket for the front gate on August 11. Any relevant photos were provided to the RCMP by the worker involved.

The officer provided an update on this incident on August 12 and mentioned that they connected the truck to other thefts in the area and that the truck itself was stolen from the Fort Saskatchewan area, but they are taking action on it.

Date: August 11, 2025

Type: Potential Break & Enter Near Miss

<u>Description</u>: While leaving the main office through the south exit, the employee noticed a person wearing a hoodie and looking into another employee's vehicle. Once this person saw the employee, they appeared to have been scared off and headed behind the legion building.

Cause: Crime

<u>Action:</u> The employee who saw this informed the owner of the vehicle. The security camera footage was reviewed, and it showed that someone was walking past the vehicle at the time; however, they didn't slow down or even stop nearby. A company-wide email was sent to mitigate any employee concerns.

Date: August 12, 2025

Type: Security Related Incident

<u>Description:</u> A worker arrived at the Smoky Lake Landfill to pick up the paint and noticed a camping trailer that had been dropped off the day prior. The worker went to check it out since the door was left wide open and saw drug paraphernalia, body armour, and a police badge. The worker then called their manager and informed them that they were going to phone the RCMP.

<u>Cause:</u> People dropping off possibly illegal items

<u>Action:</u> The incident was reported to the RCMP immediately, and any relevant camera footage was provided the same day. Per the department manager, ratepayers will no longer be allowed to leave camping trailers at the landfills, and the department will send out a memo to all the landfill operators. RCMP confiscated the items.

Date: August 13, 2025

Type: Minor Injury Incident

<u>Description:</u> While trying to get the security camera down to get footage for another incident, an employee cut their finger on a jagged edge on a pole. The worker used their gloves to put the pole back up after their finger was cut.

Cause: Improper use of PPE

Action: The worker will wear the required PPE.

Date: August 18, 2025

Type: Trespassing Incident

<u>Description:</u> Someone broke into the Smoky Lake Landfill on August 17th at night, and while a worker was near the landfill on August 18th after it had closed for the day, they were informed that the individual who broke in the night prior was there again. The worker then located the individual and told them to stay out of the landfill.

Cause: Crime

Action: The worker reported the trespassing incidents to the RCMP.

Date: August 20, 2025

Type: Potential Fleet Damage Near Miss

<u>Description:</u> When hooked up to Unit 100C, the brakes on Unit 126 failed to work. The employee then hooked the trailer (126) up to 106A, and again, the trailer brakes failed to work. The same thing happened when it was connected to 107B. The employee informed their manager and coworkers of the issue as another crew was taking Unit 126. The manager instructed the workers to have the mechanics assess the trailer before taking it out, but no checks or repairs were done.

Cause: Mechanical/Wiring Fault

<u>Action:</u> The mechanics looked into the issue and discovered that the issue was with a specific year of the truck. There are no major repairs to be done on our end as GMC is looking into it.

Upon further investigation regarding Unit 126 going out without being checked, the crew tested the brakes on the trailer, and they were functional.

Date: August 21, 2025

Type: Fleet Damage Incident

<u>Description:</u> While pushing piles of garbage, a board hit the right side window of Unit 240,

shattering it.

Cause: Lack of awareness, operator error.

Action: The window is scheduled to be replaced.

Date: August 22, 2025

Type: Attempted Theft Incident

<u>Description:</u> A worker was woken up by their dog barking at 2:35 AM. The worker got up and saw from their window that a grey Dodge duel wheel truck was driving in their yard and backed into their power pole and breaker box. They had pulled the hose on the fuel tank down, and when the worker scared them off, the hose was on the ground. The worker had called out and informed them that the cops were on the way, causing them to take off, leaving the hose to the fuel tank on the ground. The worker is unsure whether any fuel was stolen.

Cause: Crime

<u>Action:</u> The worker informed the RCMP; however, no file was created as the damage that was caused was estimated at \$100.

Date: August 27, 2025

Type: Fleet Damage Incident

<u>Description:</u> While turning around in an approach, the driver felt Unit 141 start to lean towards the passenger side, so they accelerated to try and level it out, but Unit 141 ended up falling on its side.

Cause: Operator error

<u>Action:</u> The operator was immediately taken to the hospital for medical assessment and was cleared with no injuries, other than elevated blood pressure likely due to the stress from the incident.

The operator will no longer use the approach to turn around.

Unit 141 was recovered, underwent an on-site mechanical assessment, and received repairs before being cleared to return to the shop. The department manager reported the incident to the RCMP for insurance purposes. A claim was submitted to the insurance on Aug 28, and any necessary information is being provided to the RCMP.

The mechanics will conduct a further assessment of Unit 141 and determine any repairs.

<u>Date:</u> Reported on August 28, 2025, otherwise date unknown

Type: County Property Damage Incident

<u>Description:</u> In the upstairs storage room at the Public Works Shop, 3 grader windows were appropriately stored. An employee noticed that 2 out of 3 windows were broken.

Cause: Unknown

<u>Action:</u> The broken windows were disposed of, and the mechanics will order windows on an asneeded basis.

Department: Bylaw and Enforcement Reporting Period: August

1. Key Accomplishments

- Officially received Peace Officer Appointment approval from the Government of Alberta.
- Secured a new reporting system to improve statistical record-keeping and reporting accuracy.
- Finalized the design of a new shoulder patch for departmental use.

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

Connectivity issues and equipment shortages have created barriers to full operational effectiveness. These concerns have been documented, and options for equipment upgrades and improved connectivity are being reviewed to bring the department in line with operational standards.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

With the appointment finalized, the Peace Officer is focusing on learning the service area and beginning to provide traffic enforcement and bylaw compliance monitoring. These initial steps lay the foundation for advancing Council's priorities for community safety, enforcement, and visible presence.

4. Staffing & Resources

No Staffing issues.

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Worked with the Executive Services Coordinator to review bylaws and policies, ensuring that enforcement actions can be properly supported and applied.
- Anticipated collaboration with other departments—including Public Works and Fire Protective Services—as enforcement activities expand.

6. Next Steps & Outlook

- Establish and refine departmental systems to ensure smooth operations and legislative compliance.
- Continue orientation within the service area to build visibility and community presence.
- Work with Executive Services to ensure bylaws and policies remain enforceable and aligned with operational requirements.

• Focus on building the department to meet operational standards, including policy development, training, and equipment procurement.

Department: Finance **Reporting Period:** August, 2025

1. Key Accomplishments

The Finance Department created two new policies for Council consideration. The Community Capital Grants Policy was developed to establish a program to fund community projects that align with County priorities. The Financial Reserve Policy will provide future decision makers with an understanding of the reserves and ensure that the County is saving for future projects.

The 2025 insurance renewal for both the County and Water Commission were submitted.

The 5 Year financial plan was brought to Council and approved.

2026 budget worksheets were set up for the departments.

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

The Finance Department did not have any operational challenges during the month of August.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

The Finance Department supported the County's Strategic Plan by:

- Good Governance: Developing the Financial Reserve Policy to strengthen fiscal responsibility and long-term sustainability.
- Community Growth & Development: Introducing the Community Capital Grants Policy, which directly supports Council's priority to encourage community-based initiatives that enhance services within the community.

4. Staffing & Resources

Staff were busy covering for summer vacations, ensuring operations continued smoothly without disruption

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Collaborated with Public Works, GIS, and the CAO to explore options for improving inventory and asset repair cost tracking and reporting.
- Distributed 10-Year Capital Plan information to all departments for updating as part of the 2026 budget preparation process.

6. Next Steps & Outlook

- Focus on property tax collection and receipting, which will be a major priority for September and October.
- Continue budget preparations for 2026, ensuring alignment with Council's priorities and the approved Five-Year Financial Plan.

- Completed the 10-year draft capital plan and submitted to the Finance Manager
- Completed the Medical First Responders (MFR) grant and received \$1,964.00 for the fire department responding to medical calls.
- Completed safety data sheets (SDS) and 22 job site hazard assessments which were put into the 3 fire halls for the members to review
- Met with Ian Fox the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) coordinator to discuss the County's involvement, sent the fire department apparatus listing and fire department inventory. Ian Fox also completed an apparatus assessment that was entered into the Provincial database
- Met with fire investigators and completed the fire report for the structure fire investigation
- Completed the fire report and send pictures to Alberta Environment from the oil tanker collision where 30 cubes of oil spilt and mostly burnt

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

- 24 SCBA packs were flow tested and inspected with 3 SCBA packs needing repairs as per OHS requirements.
- 48 SCBA Bottles were hydro tested and passed as per OHS requirements
- Smoky Lake Engine 459 auto eject was replaced and wiring for charging stations in the back compartment was completed.
- Waskatenau Rapid Attack 462 batteries were dead after a master switch was installed, batteries were recharged and awaiting scheduling to have a trickle charge system installed.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

• Passing the Smoky Lake County Region Fire Rescue Services bylaw is completing the next step to securing a reliable and effective fire service for the region.

4. Staffing & Resources

- One member attended the Alberta Fire Chiefs Association training on the 2026 Fire Services Training Grant, Level of Service survey results, and the new provincial fire reporting system.
- Incident Responses:
 - Smoky Lake Fire: 4 collisions, 1 structure fire, 2 electrical fires, 2 agricultural fires,
 1 medical call, and 5 fire alarms.
 - o Vilna Fire: 2 collisions, 1 grass fire, 2 medical calls, and 3 fire alarms.
 - Waskatenau Fire: 1 structure fire, 1 vehicle fire, 2 grass fires, 1 medical call, and
 1 electrical hazard.
- In August, backup coverage was required five times by a second fire department due to low member turnout, and once by a third department.

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Worked with Public Works to fix and maintain the fire apparatus
- Working with Health and Safety Coordinator to complete the required directives given from the formal inspections of the fire halls

6. Next Steps & Outlook

- Researching pricing on fireproof storage cabinets for the fire halls

Department: Natural Gas **Reporting Period:** August 1-31, 2025

1. Key Accomplishments

- Completed four new gas service installations.
- Began planning for the service line installation and upgrade at the Healing Waters Center.

- Processed and issued August gas bills to customers (mailed/e-mailed), including a bill stuffer promoting the new County Request Management software for service requests.
- Replaced gas meters and AMR heads; delivered two pallets of gas meters (approx. 50 meters per pallet) to the meter shop for recertification. Completion and return expected by the end of September for installation.
- Completed 145 line locates and 4 emergency locates.
- Responded to 5 service calls (4 gas odor complaints and 1 appliance issue).

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

Odorant truck activity has been very busy, requiring two staff members to focus on operations, reducing capacity for regular County business. This demand stems from catching up after the truck was down for an extended refurbishment period.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

- Emergency Services & Safety: Completed numerous line locates, service calls, and emergency odor responses, directly supporting the County's priority to maintain safe and reliable natural gas service.
- Proactivity in Development: Advanced planning for the Healing Waters Center service line installation demonstrates proactive infrastructure support, aligning with Council's vision of fostering growth and community development.
- Good Governance: Billing improvements, including the integration of communication on the new Request Management software, contributed to enhanced transparency and resident engagement.

4. Staffing & Resources

- One staff member successfully completed the Health & Safety Committee Course on August 27.
- Staff holidays were accommodated without major disruption to operations.

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Processed monthly water meter readings and issued water bills for Warspite residents.
- Reviewed the Line Locate Request Policy prepared by the Safety Officer and provided additional feedback.
- Reviewed and updated the Explosives Storage Magazine licence and documentation to reflect staffing changes in the Agricultural Fieldman position.

6. Next Steps & Outlook

- Prepare an RFD for proposed gas rate changes (initially brought to Council September 11, with additional details to be presented September 25).

 Regional Waterline.
- Finalized Emergency Response Plans for truck fills, booster stations, and landfills.
- Installed updated credit card readers at the Bellis and Spedden truck fills.
- Met with the contractor awarded the installation of the backup generator at the Warspite Booster Station.
- Met with Nova Construction regarding the Highway 28/63 Regional Waterline crossing at Range Road 210.
- Met with the Town of Smoky Lake to coordinate commissioning of the new reservoir and level control system.
- Oversaw cleaning and inspection of the Whitefish Lake reservoir by Aqua Tech.
- Completed monthly water meter readings in Warspite.
- Repaired the water truck fill distribution hose.

Despite sending garbage trucks on Saturdays during long weekends, bins were still full. The department will continue posting reminders on social media and exploring other solutions.
- Beaver activity at Hanmore Lake has increased, leading to tree damage at campsites.
 Trees are being wrapped with chicken wire for protection, and the local trapper with the registered trapline has been notified for further mitigation.

3. Staffing & Resources:

- One water and wastewater technician returned from sick leave following surgery.
- A waste technician attended the Alberta CARE Conference and will prepare a report on upcoming industry issues.

4. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Public Works provided support with landfill push-ups, burn pits, and metal pile management.
- Agriculture Department: Environmental Operations is coordinating with mowing operators to monitor work schedules and ensure operators report home safely at the end of each day.

5. Next Steps & Outlook

- Review and evaluate RFPs for waste pickup and trucking services.
- Begin removing fallen and unsafe leaning trees at campsites once the camping season concludes.
- Start winterizing truck fills and fire hydrants as freezing temperatures approach.

- Tree cutting, clean-up, and patching carried out across all divisions.

- Weed whacking around bridge decks and guard rails completed (ongoing).
- Sign installations completed across the County.
- Fencing installed on the north and south sides of BF8201.
- Shop yard clean-up initiated in preparation for winter.
- Progress made on Gladdens Pit reclamation, nearing completion.

Planning & Budgeting

- Completed the Capital Budget, Operating Budget, and Five-Year Road Plan for upcoming years.
- Rock installed at the Vic Trail flag site for Planning & Development.

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

Staff Shortages:

- Challenges due to illnesses, medical leaves, and the departure of temporary summer staff returning to school.
- Four full-time staff currently on medical leave, with additional staff away for medical and vacation time.

- Work has been completed, but progress has been slower than expected.
- Staff worked collaboratively to maintain workflow and cover essential tasks.

Inventory & Equipment Management:

- Ongoing issues with stocking parts and supplies.
- Exploring vehicle maintenance software and the conversion of the shop parts room into a structured tool crib system.
- Considering the addition of a dedicated parts person to oversee inventory and supply management.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

- Operational Efficiency: Steps taken to improve vehicle and equipment maintenance, inventory management, and shop organization support the County's strategic goal of improving operational capacity and service delivery.
- Infrastructure Readiness: Road preparation, crack sealing, reclamation, and graveling
 activities directly support Council's priority to maintain reliable and safe infrastructure
 across the County.

4. Staffing & Resources

- The Temporary Full-Time Operator 4 (Grader Operator) position was filled internally, with the employee starting blading roads on September 22, 2025.
- A Temporary Full-Time Operator 3 position will be posted to backfill the vacancy created by this internal move.
- Ongoing medical and vacation leaves continue to affect staffing levels, but operations are being managed despite delays.

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

- Collaborated with Public Works Cat Operator to push up landfill material, burn pits, and metal piles.
- Assisted Planning & Development with rock placement at Vic Trail flag site.

6. Next Steps & Outlook

• Begin a full inventory count of shop tools and parts once staff are available.

- Continue exploring the hiring of a dedicated parts person and the adoption of new software for inventory and supply tracking.
- Complete remaining road projects and prepare County roads for freeze-up.
- Finalize clean-up of shop yard and Gladdens Pit reclamation.
- Continue scheduling maintenance and recertification services for shop equipment.
- Review, improve, and update road maintenance policies to ensure alignment with operational needs and Council priorities.

Department: Planning and Development Department **Reporting Period:** August2025

1. Key Accomplishments

- Processed and issued four Development Permits.
- Closed three subdivision files.
- Advanced Bylaw 1482-25 through Third Reading, successfully redistricting a property from Agriculture to Highway Commercial. The Department is now working with the landowner on the Development Permit application for a commercial use.
- Secured Water Act approvals to proceed with boat launch work at Desjarlais Crossing and Pakan Landing; working with Public Works to prepare cost estimates for the 2026 budget.
- Secured Public Lands Act approval for erosion mitigation work at Mons Lake; currently working with a consultant to obtain the corresponding Water Act approval.

2. Operational Challenges & Solutions

The Planning and Development Department did not experience any operational challenges during this reporting period save for experiencing some tight deadlines to meet regarding agenda items for Council/Special Council meetings. These challenges were overcome by reprioritizing other tasks to ensure that the tasks with top priority were completed on time. The Planning and Development Manager does not foresee these operational challenges to continue in the future as they were the product of the election cycle combined with issues arising that required immediate attention.

3. Progress on Strategic Goals

The Planning and Development Department has assisted Council in meeting its Strategic Priorities in the following ways:

- Processing redistricting application to redistrict land from Agriculture to Highway Commercial to facilitate commercial development (Priority #1 - Grow Employment Opportunities).
- Reviewing existing rules regarding recreational vehicles on agricultural lands (Priority #2

 Proactivity in Development).
- Facilitation of discussion with the Intermunicipal Planning Committee re: IDP amendment (Priority #2 – Proactivity in Development)
- Supporting the GIS Operator with the implementation of the County's new Service Request system.

4. Staffing & Resources

- No staffing changes during this period.
- The Planning and Development Manager was on leave for one day.
- The Planning and Development Manager and two Subdivision and Development Appeal Board (SDAB) Members completed SDAB training. Both Members passed their exams and are now certified for three years. The Manager passed both the Clerk and Member exams and is certified for each role for three years.

5. Interdepartmental Collaboration

The Planning and Development Department has worked in collaboration with other Departments in the following ways:

- Worked with Executive Services, the Public Works Department, the GIS Operator and the Finance Department/CAO to devise a plan to consolidate the County's road policies into a single policy in order to ensure service level expectations are being met and to assist with the budgeting process.
- Worked with the Public Works Department to prepare a cost estimate for works related to boat launches at Desjarlais Crossing and Pakan Landing for the 2026 budget.
- Worked with the Public Works Department on the installation of a large rock to facilitate the installation of the plaques commemorating the recent designation of the North Saskatchewan River as a Heritage River.
- Worked with Executive Services, the GIS Operator and the Road Foreman to resolve a grazing lease issue near the County's Legacy Pit.

6. Next Steps & Outlook

The Department's primary focus during the next reporting period will be to prepare the Department's 2026 Operating and Capital Budgets. The Department will also be working on the

proposed annexation by the Village of Waskatenau as well as next steps relating to proposed development within the lands that are the subject of the proposed annexation.

The Department will also continue its day-to-day tasks processing Development Permit, subdivision, business license and Compliance Certificate applications, and responding to public inquiries/complaints. The Planning and Development Manager also plans on attending the Lunch and Learn on October 2 to learn more about POPA and privacy legislation.

The Smoky Lake Food Bank has been in operation since mid 2006 and our society would like to extend our gratitude that the Smoky Lake County has accommodated the needs of the community by providing distribution space with a sink. Initially, a five year contract was written and it might be prudent to have a new contract drawn up. Without this in-kind contribution, this food bank would not exist.

There are families in the county who struggle to make ends meet. Food Banks are not a permanent source of groceries for people to use throughout their life, they are to help people out in the short-term situations or to fill the gap between monthly income and bills. The amount of food we provide is usually enough for a week to ten days so people cannot become dependent on the food bank. Whatever the reasons for people needing to come to the food bank, the children are particularly a concern for us. We are appealing to you for ongoing in-kind support because your backing is essential to make the Smoky Lake Food Bank operable.

The food bank has an ongoing need for the storage, sorting, hamper assembling and distribution of food as well as the handwash station, phoneline, desk, tables and sturdy shelves.
